J. W. Bailey, Oregon state dairy and food commissioner, has issued an order stating that he will enforce the law, which requires that every square of butter kept or expressed, or offered for sale in the state, shall contain not less than 8 ounces, 16 ounces, or 32 ounces, and each square or roll shall be plainly marked with the number of ounces they contain. This applies to all butter, both country and creamery, whether the same be made inside or outside the state. Better mark and weigh your butter and avoid any possible danger of trouble.

Garrison Is Brought Back

Frank Garrison, who was convicted of the murder of Roy Perkins a year or so ago, has been brought back from the Salem penitentiary to Coquille to be placed on trial again next month.

Garrison was convicted on the first trial and sentenced to be executed but was granted a new trial on an appeal to the Oregon supreme court.

As the alleged confession of Garrison, it is claimed, cannot be introduced as evidence in the next trial, the state's case against him will be weakened considerably.

Garrison did not cause any trouble on the way back. He was brought in via Gardiner and during the wait for the train at Marshfield was confined in the city jail.

City Grows

Location Has Much to Do With Richmond's Development.

(San Francisco Examiner.)

Richmond, August 9.—If there is anyone interested in seeing a city in the building—in observing a buzz of development that is moulding the youngest commercial and factory center in California into one of the most important cities in the West—he should take a trip to Richmond. Though this city has a rather isolated and independent location on its T-shaped peninsula across the Bay from San Francisco, one can reach it quickly by ferry, by any one of four transcontinental railroads or by fast traction service from Oakland or Berkeley, connecting with the Key Route boats.

From the hills that rim its western water front clear over to the range that borders it at the east, every thing is astir in Richmond today. It all means progress. The hundreds of visitors and investors who are attracted here by the stories they hear of the activity receive a forceful object lesson of how fast a young city can grow if it has the factors necessary.

Richmond's greatest growth has come since the incorporation of the four contiguous towns of Point Richmond, Richmond proper, Atchison and Winhaven into the one city of Richmond only six years ago.

It really had its start ten years ago, when the Santa Fe made its terminal here, but the rapid development came after the incorporation of the present city, which, with its immediate subdivisions, has nearly 12,000 population today and is growing faster than ever.

Since the incorporation six years ago \$1,000,000 worth of street and sewer-work has been done and the contracts now in hand reach a quarter of a million. In every part of the city the visitor sees gangs of men at work building macadam or asphalt streets, laying sewer, gas or water pipe or putting down concrete sidewalks. It all shows that the city is expanding. The council has had a race to keep public improvements going at a pace equal to the growth, but it boasts that no other city in the State, population compared, can beat Richmond in that line.

Notice of Sale of Improvement Bonds.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, at the office of the Recorder of said city, until 6 o'clock p. m. of the 6th day of December, 1911, for street improvement bonds of said city. Said bonds aggregate in amount \$1,206.79. They are issued in denominations of not less than \$25.00 or more than \$500.00.

They bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date thereof, payable semi-annually. Said bonds mature in ten years from the date they bear. Any bond may be fully paid and cancelled after one year from the date thereof, at the time of any semi-annual coupon period, upon notice.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Every bid must designate the denomination of bond desired and must be accompanied by a certified check equal to five per cent. of the amount of bid, which shall be forfeited in case the bidder refuses to accept the bonds applied for.

All bids must be sealed in plain envelopes and endorsed, "Bid for Improvement Bond of the City of Bandon" without any other distinguishing mark.
