New Commandments For Husband's Benefit.

A series of "Ten Commandments for Wives," prepared by Rev. Albert Hyde, of the Porter Congregational church of Brockton, Mass., is being circulated in printed form. They are as follows:

- "Thou shalt not marry for revenue, or even to escape being an old maid. After the marriage thou shalt not put on an old wrapper, or wear slippers run down at the heels."
- "Thou shalt not be a slave of fashions."
- "Thou shalt not be a gossip."
- "Thou shalt be out of sorts when thy neighbor in a limousine smiles on thee in a trolley car."
- "Thou shalt not break down the no license law by serving punch at thy parties."
- "Thou shalt not forget the age of thy children in the public conveyance."
- "Thou shalt not 'let loose' on thy husband on wash day or even house-cleaning time."
- "Thou shalt not spell home as 'matinee,' or 'club' or 'moving pictures.'"
- "Thou shalt not forget where thy Bible is and be unable to find it when thy minister comes."

Fight Intemperance By Cheapening Drink.

What is known as the "Chemung plan" is now being thoroughly discussed throughout the east. The plan is a unique and bold proposition to remove the cause of intemperance by making trade conditions such that the saloon would not be a profitable investment. While the percentage of profit in liquor would remain as under present conditions, the amount of money involved in the transactions of jobbing and retailing would be so trivial that the gross profit would not pay rental charges, lights, help and other expensive allurements of the American saloon.

The salient feature of the Chemung plan is to remove all taxes on malt and distilled liquor, thus making liquor a free commodity of trade and so cheap that the saloon would be eliminated and the traffic in liquor diverted into regular mercantile channels.

The advocates of the Chemung plan contend that, with the government or federal tax removed and no excise license to pay, whisky could be sold at retail for from 20 cents to

30 cents a gallon and afford a reasonable profit at that. With free competition in the liquor traffic many shopkeepers would add whisky and beer to their stock, because liquor would be a legitimate article of merchandise, selling at a reasonable profit for about 5 cents a quart or 1 cent a glass. With this competition on every hand, the regular saloon, as now conducted, with its free lunch, dazzling lights, alluring music and expensive investments, would be threatened with bankruptcy.

The Chemung plan advocates say that the present liquor laws glorify liquor. Taking whisky as a specific instance, they relate that it is manufactured, aged and barreled at a cost of 15 cents a gallon, and when it reaches the consumer under present conditions it brings \$6.50 a gallon, as sold in saloons by the glass. It is the internal revenue tax and excise requirements that lay the foundation for this enormous increase beyond its intrinsic value. The Chemung plan, it is maintained, would reduce liquor to a cheap article of merchandise, and the inexorable law of business would soon make competition such that no dealer could afford to maintain an elaborate establishment for its exclusive sale.

Active Near Florence.

The Eugene Register says: "Dr. W. L. Cheshire and W. C. Yocan are home from a horseback trip to western Lane county, especially the lake region south of Florence, along the coast. They say there is considerable activity in real estate for small places for summer homes in this attractive locality. One man who had a farm of 240 acres, on which he could hardly make a living for the last ten years, recently sold it to Portland parties for \$8,000. These people will subdivide it into tracts for summer homes. You can't hear anything else but railroad talk in the western part of the county, but there is great speculation over what the two lines are going to do down the Siuslaw. One report has it that the Southern Pacific will go up a branch of the Wildcat and go down Knowles Creek to Mapleton, which Horace Fisk says is a more practicable and shorter route than down the Siuslaw proper. They can hardly wait until spring to see what will be done."

Hill Gets Northwestern.

Seattle, Wash. Dec. 19.—That the Chicago & Northwestern and Northwestern and Northern Pacific have formed more than a traffic agreement to run through trains from Portland and Seattle to Chicago, and that the Northern Pacific line is now, or shortly will be the Northwestern's own outlet to Portland and the Puget Sound country, was the declaration of traffic officials of all lines who have been watching the movements of the two companies for the past year.

Color was given to the belief by the announcement by President Howard Elliott, from New York, of the traffic agreement in regard to passenger service inaugurated on Thursday.
