Fire broke out on the steam schooner Yosemite on Dec. 27th, when the vessel was in a storm off Trinidad Point. The Yosemite was loaded with lumber and had a few passengers on board when she sailed from Astoria. She was bound for San Pedro, but put in to San Francisco for repairs, and a dispatch from that city, dated on the 28th, says: "Passengers were only prevented from leaping overboard by stern orders from Capt. Nelson. For more than an hour the crew and a few of the calmer passengers waged a battle against the flames, which left the vessel badly burned on the port side. Mrs. M. H. Deane and Mrs. S. Carson of Portland tried to launch a life boat, but were held back. Mrs. Deane's husband, an invalid, was overcome by smoke in a lower stateroom. The women stood for hours in their night clothing on the upper deck, while rain, storm and flames raged about them." —Coos Bay News.
