Baker May Change Rule.

Baker, Or., Jan. 2nd.—(Special) A long-threatened movement to try to return Baker from the commission form of government to the old Alderman rule was started Thursday when E. T. Beers, ex-Alderman, started a petition asking the present City Commissioners to call a special election March 11th to give the voters a chance to decide whether the old or present form of government shall prevail. Mr. Beers and Attorney Joseph Hellner, who drafted the revision of the old charter, refuse to say who started the movement, but deny that the saloon keepers, who are credited with being dissatisfied with the commission plan, have anything to do with the movement.

In the plea for a return to the old style of government many material changes to the old charter are suggested, including the election of a Mayor and Treasurer with salaries of \$50 a month each and election of 8 Aldermen, two from each ward, with salaries of \$50 a meeting, but not to exceed \$20 a month. All other officials are to be appointed by the Mayor with consent of the Aldermen, salaries to be fixed by the Aldermen and removal being in their hands.

The Initiative, referendum and recall will stand on a 10 per cent. basis. Remonstrances against street improvements shall require the signatures of two-thirds of the property holders, instead of the present three-fourths, and trial by jury before police magistrate will be allowed subject to the approval of the Circuit Court.

Mr. Beers is confident that he will easily have the required number of names.

School Children of Oregon Will be Taught Agriculture.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 2.—A statewide campaign of education that leads toward instead of away from the farm is to be undertaken early in the year. The State Bankers' Association, the Oregon Agricultural College and the Oregon Development League are co-operating with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to formulate a course of study to be introduced into public schools of Oregon.

A conference will be held at Corvallis about the middle of January at which the various interests will be represented and a course of instruction will be adopted. Commercial organizations are expected to arrange simultaneous meetings throughout the state at which their members will be informed on the plan and speakers selected to visit the local schools and deliver talks to the children along these lines. The school meetings will also be held on a date to be announced later.

Cities of Oregon.

Oregon has 97 cities, of which Portland, the largest, has a population of 207,214, and Salem, the second city, a population of 14,024. There are also 5 cities having from 5,000 to 10,000, 9 having from 2,500 to 5,000 and 81 having less than 2,500 inhabitants.

Table 2 shows the population in 1910 of all the cities of the state, with comparative figures, where possible, for 1910 and 1890. Table 3 shows the population of the seven cities having in 1910 over 5,000 inhabitants, as reported at each Federal census since their incorporation either as cities or towns, so far as figures are available, together with the increase during each decade.

Of the seven cities included in this table, Portland, Salem, Eugene, Medford, and Ashland show very high rates of increase for the last decade, ranging from 90.6 per cent in Ashland to 393.6 per cent in Medford. Baker City shows the lowest rate of increase, namely, 1.2 per cent. During the preceding decade, however, there was a marked growth in the population of this city, the percentage of increase being 155.9. It will be noted that a high rate of increase in population has prevailed in Portland since its incorporation, the percentages of increase ranging from 94.9 for the decade 1890-1900 to 188.6 for the decade 1860-1870.

Admiral Evans Dead.

Washington, Jan. 3.—Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans, "Fighting Bob" to an admiring Nation, died suddenly today at his home in this city. Acute indigestion ended the career of one of the most popular officers of the Navy. He was ill less than three hours.

Admiral Evans arose today apparently in better health and spirits than he had enjoyed in some. For years a sufferer from old wounds sustained in the Civil War and from recurrent attacks of rheumatic gout, the aged fighter seemed to have shaken off the burden of his advancing days. He displayed high spirits at breakfast, and ate a hearty luncheon at noon.
