Saved the Northwest.

In your issue of Jan. 23, page 2, you had an article from the New York Herald: "Saved the Northwest." There are two sides to this story; you gave one, may I give the other?

At the time of the dispute between the two nations, the English and the American was at its highest, the English Parliament requested Queen Victoria to send three Commissioners to investigate the value of this territory.

A man-of-war was selected and fitted out to carry those commissioners to the Pacific ocean, and arrived in due time at Astoria. Three members of the highest aristocracy had been appointed to investigate conditions and return and report whether it was advisable to send a number of ships and troops to take possession of the coast or to settle matters peacefully with the United States. After the arrival different trips were made up the Columbia. At that time all our streams were at certain times crowded with salmon. The commissioners being great sportsmen, and seeing those fish in large runs, and at times jumping from the water, desired to catch some with rod and line, such as the English people use in their brooks to catch fish, using all kinds of bait; but no matter what the hooks were baited with, the salmon refused to bite.

The whole country being so truly overgrown with timber and dense undergrowth that the expeditions made by those investigators became too laborious for the noble commissioners and detachments of sailors sent out to see what they could find. They returned after a jolly day or two, living highly on provisions furnished by the stewards, and accompanied by a liberal supply of "hale" and other strong drinks, and reported that they could not see much to fight for. They concluded that a country where even the fish do not bite was not worth possessing, and so at their return to London, reported to the Queen and Parliament, and a settlement with the United States was easily accomplished.

This seems perhaps to some of the readers somewhat of a fish story. However, I can give another account of commissioners paid by the state of Oregon and visiting this country, also became so displeased because our fish would not bite, that they forgot to investigate what they came for, and after an hour's fishing without success, returned from their errand neither wiser nor better. As one of the gentlemen said: "One hour's work is as good as a day's work, the state pays for it. It is three years now that he has not showed up. Nevertheless the state pays yearly so much anyhow."
