Industrial Education All Right, but Don't Forget the Sciences

AMERICAN people have the right idea about industrial education, but you are in DANGER OF DOING ONE THING YOU MAY IN YEARS TO COME REGRET.

YOU ARE LIKELY TO GO TO THE EXTREME OF ELIMINATING THE SCIENTIFIC TEACHING, THE NECESSARY MENTAL BASIS, IN ORDER TO MAKE ROOM FOR YOUR INDUSTRIAL TRAINING. I BEG YOU, DON'T DO THAT.

Always remember that scientific training is the BASIS FOR EVERYTHING and that industrial training, while a thing much to be desired and now coming to be demanded, must be made SECONDARY. Unless you are careful you will soon have a nation of mere skilled workmen and will not then make that progress which only scientific minds can bring.

What should be done and what Dr. Leitz, the foremost of the industrial training men in Germany, is doing is to TAKE THE PUPILS TO THE COUNTRY.

And you do not pay enough attention to conservation. Perhaps you think you don't have to. We in Germany thought so for many, many years. Then we woke to find we were too WASTEFUL, and we taught our schoolboys and schoolgirls to SAVE.

STREET TREES AS BEAUTIFIERS

Results Obtained in Holland Through Systematic Culture.

EXAMPLES FOR AMERICA.

Small Cost Per Capita For Care of Trees in Utrecht and The Hague. Valuable From Hygienic Point of View—Their Worst Enemy.

Now that there is beginning a general movement in the United States to bring about systematic cultivation of trees, not only by reforestation on a grand scale, but by the growth of shade trees in towns and cities for the ornamentation of streets, the experience of Holland in providing forest effects for its citizens should be of interest to Americans. There is perhaps no other well populated country in the world which has so many well wooded towns as has Holland. Most of the streets and grachten, or canals, have av-

More important than trees, which are upon noxious insects, for insecticides. These harmful growths are comparatively rare where trees are plentiful. Besides all this, the aesthetic value of beautiful trees certainly is not small. In Holland all these useful services are gratefully recognized and the trees

and carefully tended by the municipalities. The cost of this care per capita in the different towns varies somewhat. Last year, for example, Utrecht devoted 21 cents Dutch to its trees for each inhabitant and The Hague 28 cents.

It has been found that not every kind of tree will thrive in the streets of a town, for trees have many enemies both above and below ground. Gas escaping from pipes underground is the worst enemy of trees, because quite small quantities of it are deadly. For this reason special precautions are taken against the leakage of gas in Dutch towns. How electricity escaping under ground acts upon trees as yet has not been sufficiently studied to be understood. Trees will not grow in very narrow streets where the houses are high. Neither will they thrive if the movement does not let in moisture and air in sufficient quantities.

Sacred Teeth.
Teeth of all kinds have been worshipped and are, in fact, venerated as relics in some religious shrines. Buddha's tooth is preserved in an Indian temple, the Chinese worship the tooth of a monkey, while the elephant's and shark's teeth serve a similar purpose among the Malabar and Tonga Islanders respectively. The Siamese were formerly the possessors of the tooth of a sacred monkey, which they valued very highly, but in a war with the Portuguese they lost the holy grinder and had to pay \$3,500,000 to get it back again. It is now kept in a small gold box, enclosed in six other boxes, in one of the many temples of the Siamese capital.

enues of trees. Utrecht has two rows of trees on either side of its quinal canals. Its canal banks are constructed as if in two stories. The lower story, almost flush with the water level, is lined with warehouses and vaults, while the upper story has dwellings and shops.

Not only do shady walks tempt people to enjoy the open air, but the living roots in the soil have a purifying effect, which was by no means to be despised in the past, when the drainage of Dutch towns left much to be desired. Further, the foliage produces ozone and purifies the air. It also tends to keep the air moist and to temper the wind, thus causing less dust to be blown about. In the autumn the fallen leaves give the same kind of service that is given by tea leaves scattered on a floor when the room is to be swept—they lay the dust

EASTERN OREGON IS STRONG FOR SELLING

Candidate Has Many Friends East of Mountains.

Newspapers of That Section Advise the People to Support Selling.

Positive in the belief that a change is needed for the best interests of Oregon in the United States senate, many newspapers in Eastern Oregon have openly declared themselves for Ben Selling to succeed Senator Jonathan Bourne.

In a recent issue the La Grande Evening Observer editorially remarked:

By the way, Mr. Voter, have you ever seen Jonathan Bourne? What do you know about him other than to receive a letter occasionally written by a paid stenographer and signed with a rubber stamp? Can you point to anything of importance that he has done for Oregon? You know of course that he voted with Aldrich and the rich men of the east on tariff issues. You know he owns a large cotton goods manufacturing plant on the Atlantic seaboard and that he is reputed to be worth \$15,000,000. You know also that his interests in Oregon are so meager that his tax is exactly \$2.44 according to the Portland Journal of Sunday, Mar. 3rd.

"All of these things being true, don't you think it is time to replace him with a citizen of the state—a man who has lived over half a century in Oregon—who has property nowhere else and who stands his share of taxes and works every day in the year to build up his state?

"Is it not time for Oregon to be for Oregon, as Bill Hanley says, and desist from sending a rich aristocrat whose interests lie in eastern states to assist in making laws for Oregon?

"The people have a splendid opportunity to elect a man who will represent Oregon and the Oregon system, for Ben Selling aided materially in outlining and passing every law that gives the power of government directly to the people in this state."

"OUTLOOK" FOR SELLING

Editor H. L. St. Clair Comes Out Strong and Predicts Success.

The Gresham Outlook, edited by H. L. St. Clair, one of the strong country papers of the state, has endorsed the candidacy of Ben Selling for United States senator in no unambiguous language. Here is what the Outlook editorially has to say:

"The candidacy of Ben Selling for the nomination as United States senator, to take the place occupied by Jonathan Bourne, Jr., is formally announced. Mr. Selling has been getting ready for this announcement for some time and he has been encouraged by thousands of friends. Mr. Selling is a man of practical affairs, not theories. He is a good clean Republican, not a politician. He is a thorough Oregonian and stands for the best in the Oregon system. We look for him to make a sweeping campaign and not only secure the nomination on April 19, but the election in the fall.
