Notice of Street Improvement.

Notice is hereby given: That on March 20th, 1912, the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, at a regular meeting thereof by resolution duly passed ordered that B. Street in West Bandon be improved from the South line of Cherry Street, where B. Street intersects with Cherry Street, in said West Bandon, running thence South to the South line of B. Street in West Bandon, said improvement to consist of the following:

(1st.) Grading and filling said B. Street for the full width of street between above described points.

(2nd.) Grubbing and clearing said street between said points.

(3rd.) The building of a board sidewalk on the East side of said B. Street, between above described points.

(4th.) The building of wooden gutters along the sidewalk to be constructed.

(5th.) The building of bulkheads along the property line of said B. Street, to-wit:

One on the West side of B. Street, commencing at the North side of Ash Street and extending South to the North side of Oak Street.

One on the east side of B. Street commencing at the south side of Ash street and extending south to the north line of Oak street.

Said improvements are to be constructed in accordance with the specifications of the City Engineer, as accepted by the Common Council and which are now on file at the office of the City Recorder and are open to the inspection of all persons interested therein. Now Unless, a written remonstrance be made and signed by the owners of TWO-THIRDS of the real property adjacent to and abutting upon B. Street in West Bandon between points above described, shall be filed with the City Recorder within twenty (20) days from the first publication of this notice, then the Common Council will pass an Ordinance declaring such improvement as herein specified and that the cost of said improvement be assessed to the adjacent and abutting property on B. Street between points above described.
