Schedule of Political Program For April.

The Portland Telegram says: This is to be a busy month in politics as the registration books will close and the primaries will be held, and there are a number of other dates which politicians, officers and voters should remember. Appended is the political calendar for April:

April 4-6—Dates during which County clerks shall arrange the names and other information concerning all the candidates and parties named in the valid petitions of nomination which have been filed with them, and those which have been certified to them by the Secretary of state, forthwith certify same, file in the office and post duplicates and proceed to have ballots printed.

April 9—Date on which county clerks close registration books before primaries. County clerks send immediately to the secretary of state certified copies of the numbers and totals of each party registered. County clerk shall send to the secretary of state the name and post office address of every registered voter.

April 10—Latest date on which secretary of state shall mail to registered voters copies of the official pamphlet containing the arguments of candidates.

April 18—Last day on which persons who have filed nominating petitions and who have removed from their electoral districts before the day of the direct primary nominating election may cause their names to be withdrawn in writing. Last day on which any nominating petition of the electors of a political party, vacated by death or removal from the district, may be filed by the committee which has been given the jurisdiction so to do by the political party or the law.

April 19—Primary election day. Polls open at 8 a. m. Close 7 p. m.

April 22—County clerks canvass the primary vote and transmit copies to the secretary of state. County clerks to certify the nominations and notify each person nominated. When a tie exists between two or more persons for the same nomination for a county or precinct office, the county clerk shall give notice, and at an appointed time the nomination for a county or precinct office, the county clerk shall give notice, and at an appointed time the nomination shall be decided by lot.

April 24—Last day on which to give notice of contest.

April 29—Last day on which any person not a candidate for office or nomination who expends money or value to an amount greater than \$50 for nomination or election to aid in the election or defeat of any candidate or candidates or party ticket or measures, shall file itemized statement of receipts and expenditures and vouchers with secretary of state or county clerk.

Notice To Contractors.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received for the construction or building of a barn at the Coos County Infirmary for the County of Coos, State of Oregon, according to the plans and specifications prepared by J. Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held at the usual polling places in the City of Bandon, namely: At the City Hall, in said City, for the voters residing in Range 15 West; and at the Fire Engine Hall in said City, for those voters residing in Range 14 West, of the territory hereinafter described, for the purpose of voting upon the question of the changing of the boundaries of the City of Bandon by annexing thereto the territory described as follows: Lots 2, 3, and 4, and East 1-2 of the South-East 1-4 of Section 19, together with Lots 1 and 2, and the East 1-2 of the North-East 1-4, and the South West 1-4 of the North-East 1-4 and the South-East 1-4 of Section 30, also the North 1-2 of Section 31, all in Township 28 South, Range 14 West of the Willamette Meridian; and the North 1-2 of Section 30, and all that portion of Lots 5, 6 and 7, in Section 25 lying outside of the Plat of West Bandon Addition, together with Lots 1 and 2, in Section 25, and the South 1-2 of Section 24 in Township 28 South, Range 15 West of the Willamette Meridian,
