Where She Lies.

The papers of the country have lately contained many articles concerning whether or not the Titanic went to the floor of the sea after being struck by an iceberg.

Treating the matter in a lengthy article the Seattle Times says in part:

At the point where the disaster occurred, west longitude 50.14, north latitude 41.16, the depth is 2000 fathoms, or about two and one-third miles.

The Titanic was an iron ship, and therefore sank to the bottom. Such at least, is the opinion of authorities like Frederick A. Osborn, occupying the chair of physics at the University of Washington, and of R. R. Pierson, superintendent of the Alaska Steamship company.

Any substance sinks when it displaces a greater weight of water than its own weight. The wrecked Titanic comes under that class. The wood in the vessel is considered to have been practically negligible, while its machinery and coal increase the tendency to sink; nor would a point be reached, with a substance like iron, even in the greatest depths of the ocean, where the ship would be suspended—where the sustaining power from below would balance exactly the pressure from above.

The rate of speed in sinking depends on the shape of the object. Iron shaped like a plank would descend more slowly than an iron sphere. The ship went with accelerating speed, conforming approximately to the square of the time.

In the case of the Titanic, the speed in sinking was probably less than 16 feet per second. But on account of unknown factors—whether the machinery remained in the hull or not, the condition of each of the airtight compartments and other data—the time required in sinking is very largely guesswork.

But there is no doubt in the minds of men possessing authoritative knowledge that the ruins of the noble vessel now rests on the ocean floor.

Flood Still Bad in South.

New Orleans, May 7.—Citizens of the flood menaced district of New Orleans were cheered today by a bulletin of the weather bureau which lowered the previous estimate of the flood stage that this city must fight. The army men who are working to strengthen the dykes will not cease their vigilance, however. The maximum stage of the forecast for Baton Rouge and the intervening cities was raised in the bulletin. The fight to hold the mid-state levees cannot be relaxed. Scores of refugees who were brought to Morgansea in relief boats early today say hundreds more are to be taken from the flood prisons. A majority of these persons who ignored the warnings are so far back in the country that they could not be communicated with. Reports from the flood districts are hardly more encouraging today than yesterday. The rescue work continues and the refugees camps are receiving ever increasing population. The distribution of food and shelter tents continues under the direction of the state and government authorities but there are hundreds of persons who are in dire need.

Important News of Oregon.

Portland, Or., May 9 (Special).—Seven Governors of Northwest states have joined in issuing a proclamation calling a Northwestern Development Congress to meet at Seattle June 5 to 8. The states of Oregon, Washington, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana and Idaho are represented in the call and these will all have representatives at the Congress.

The chief purpose of the conference is to plan a campaign for the more rapid development of the states interested and suggest ways and means to stem the tide of emigration from the American Northwest to Canada. An elaborate program for the gathering has been prepared and in addition to Governor West C. C. Chapman, Secretary of the Oregon Development League, Carl R. Gray, president of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railway, and "Bill" Hanley are Oregonians who will deliver addresses.

The glad news went out during the past week that strawberries are ripe in Southern Oregon. Roseburg claims the honor of having the first ripe fruit, and that proud city will celebrate in honor of this precious fruit with its annual Strawberry Carnival on May 16, 17 and 18.

Eastern Oregon and the Inland Empire country report that recent heavy rains have brought millions to the farmers of that section of the Northwest by soaking the soil and bringing the needed moisture to grain and fruit crops. It is declared that never before were crop conditions so favorable for a record production.

An energetic campaign for an interstate wagon bridge between Oregon and Washington, spanning the river at Vancouver, has been started. Commercial organizations of both states are working for the project and it is expected the matter will be brought to a successful conclusion.

Medford has set the pace for other Oregon communities. Recently a carload of eggs was shipped from that point, the first consignment of that size ever sent from there. This points the way to a great industry, both there and in other sections of the state, for there is no part of Oregon where the poultry business cannot be conducted successfully.

Eye of Rabbit Is Grafted In Man.

New York, May 5.—(Special.) In the current number of the Journal the American Medical Association is told how the cornea of a rabbit's eye was grafted upon the eye of a patient in a hospital. The cornea graft is perfect and clear and vision is restored, according to the article in the Journal.

The history of the case shows that there was almost complete destruction of the cornea of the right eye and the patient was entirely blind when to the hospital. The eye was properly conditioned, the pupil dilated and the cornea removed. In describing the operation the operation the article declares that under local anaesthesia the cornea was completely excised, except one sixteenth of an inch and the cornea of a rabbit's eye was cut to the size of the excised area. Stitches were then taken in the membrane which united the globe of the eye with the eye lid and drawn over the graft to hold it in place.

Consolidated Northwest Fruit Selling Agency.

Portland, Or., May 8, (Special). Consolidation of the two movements to establish a general Northwest fruit selling agency at Portland has been effected. The Northwest Fruit Exchange has changed its by laws to provide for mutualization under control of the growers' unions which ship through the exchange. A Committee representing the Portland Commercial Club, Chamber of Commerce and Clearing House Association has investigated the subject, and recommends co-operation with the exchange on the part of the press, commercial organizations, banks and the fruit grower. The Portland bankers are arranging to finance advances to growers, based on the market value of the crop as fixed the exchange.

Until two years ago the demand for Oregon and Washington apples was so heavy that buyers eagerly purchased crops on the trees. The increase in acreage is so enormous however, that without a strong co-operative selling agency the entire prosperity of the fruit industry would be in danger. Last year, hundreds of carloads of apples, shipped by individuals and local associations, were sacrificed at auction in eastern markets for little more than freight charges.

The prices secured for those districts marketing through the Northwestern Fruit Exchange were high and the growers received large and prompt returns. Co-operation with the exchange, as re-organized, has been assured by the different commercial bodies and a vigorous campaign will be conducted to secure a heavy tonnage. The fruit districts represented at the Portland meeting were Rouge River, Mosier, Walla Walla, Yakima, Wenatchee, Cashmere, Spokane, Lewiston and Boise. A branch office of the exchange will be established at Spokane, but the operating headquarters will be built up at Portland.

Uniting these two movements means the salvation of the fruit industry by building up one strong selling agency.
