**Strawberry Crop Good.**

The Sentinel reporter "happened in" on George Henninger of Fish trap, Tuesday, and enjoyed some of the first strawberries of the season. Mr. Henninger has a patch of 5,000 strawberry plants and they are burdened with berries and blossoms. The berries now ripening are the Gold Dollar variety of which he has 2,000 plants. The first ripe berries from these plants were picked May 10th. He also has 2,000 plants of the Improved Oregon variety which he expects to ripen about June 15th, and 1,000 Marshall plants which will commence producing about May 25th.

Mr. Henninger says he has been told that berries will not produce well in that locality, but his experience has demonstrated that it would be practically impossible to find a locality or a soil better adapted to berry culture.—Coquille Valley Sentinel.

**Practice Illegally.**

Itinerant Opticians Work Rural Districts Without State License

The Oregon State Board of Examiners in Optometry will pay a reward of \$25 to anyone causing the arrest and conviction of any person or persons testing eyes and selling glasses who do not hold a certificate issued to them by the Board of Examiners. It is not alone necessary for them to possess this certificate, but it must be registered with and countersigned by the Clerk of the Court in each county where the holder practices. The public in general is hereby warned not to patronize anyone not holding such certificate, as in the strict letter of the law they are accessory to the illegal practice and will at least be called upon to go into court and testify as witnesses against the persons violating the law.

**Randolph Has Narrow Escape**

It was reported here today that the gasoline schooner Randolph, formerly plying out of Coos Bay, but now operating out of Humboldt Bay, had foundered off Smith river. The report was incorrect, although the boat did have a serious time. Lyman Wolf of Marshfield is engineer on the Randolph and Captain Johnson is well known here.

A special telegram from Eureka to The Times today gave the following particulars of the accident:

"The Randolph arrived here yesterday four days from river with her shaft broken and her propeller gone. The tug Kingfisher towed the crippled boat into Humboldt bay on Trinidad. Repairs will be completed in four days. The Randolph had 800 head of hogs on board."—Coos Bay Times.

Winthrop also said the department would not urge the construction of more submarines for stations on the coast and otherwise indicated that the department would not favor the coast in any way.
