GOATS AND INSURANCE.

You'd Hardly Think the Two Were Related, but They Are.

Everybody knows something about insurance. Almost everybody carries some—life, accident, fire, fidelity, plate glass, partnership, burglary, marine or what not—and many occasionally find the payment of the regularly recurring premiums a heavy tax, however greatly they may appreciate the advantages of holding the policies. Everybody knows something about goats, but few would think of associating goats with insurance or of acquiring goats with a view to reducing the amount of their premiums. Yet a large contracting firm in Kansas City keeps a herd of Angora goats for that very purpose.

The company's yards cover many acres of ground, and the buildings and other equipment thereon represent an investment of several hundred thousand dollars. When the yards were first established the weeds and other vegetation on the property were considered by the underwriters to be dangerous fire hazards, so much so that the rates charged were almost prohibitive. It was agreed, however, that if the weeds were kept down the premiums would be greatly reduced.

But the cost of mowing the weeds and cutting down the undergrowth would have been in itself no inconsiderable item in the yearly budget. The company accordingly bought a flock of Angora goats and turned them loose in the extrahazardous yards. The goats now keep the yards cropped as close as a mowed lawn and not only save the firm a large amount annually in fire insurance premiums, but thrive so well on the objectionable vegetation and multiply so abundantly that they have actually returned a considerable profit on the amount of the company's capital that their purchase represents.—Detroit Free Press.

DYNAMITE ACCIDENTS.

Some of the Stuff May Remain After a Charge Is Exploded.

"It is generally supposed that when a charge of dynamite has exploded it is all over—that the entire charge has been consumed," said a "hard rock" man who has worked in mines, in river tunnels and other places where high explosives are used. "This supposition, however, is not correct," he continued. "Sometimes particles of dynamite will be blown out with the broken rock. Then it becomes a menace to the workmen. It is a favorite practice of men who are waiting or resting to sit on a pile of 'muck,' as the broken rock is called, and to jab into it with a pick or a candlestick or some other steel thing, much the same as a Yankee will whistle while he talks or thinks. If the steel strikes one of these bits of dynamite that has not gone off, because the glycerin in it has started to run or because a fragment of it has been crystallized, there will be an explosion. The chances are that not one of the group of men sitting around will escape injury.

"Another frequent cause of accidents is that sometimes when the dynamite explodes and tears out the rock a small quantity of it will be left in the bottom of the drill hole, unaffected by the shock. If the drill hole that remains happens to be pointed in the right direction a lazy drill runner is likely to take advantage of it and start his new hole in the old one in order to make a record or save time. The instant his drill commences to find on the unexploded dynamite it goes off. The steel is driven back through the barrel of the machine, wrecking it and usually killing the drill runner. This explains many mysterious deaths that have been attributed to 'missed shots.'"

KILLED ONE ANOTHER.

Peasley With a Bullet In His Heart Shot His Opponent Dead.

SEVRES PORCELAIN.

An Artistic Flower Group That Deceived a French King.

The manufacture of Sevres ware is one of the oldest and most characteristic arts of the French. The Sevres potteries have long been under the direct control and patronage of the government and are in receipt of an annual subsidy.

A royal porcelain factory was first established at Vincennes in 1745 under Louis XV, and produced many notable pieces of ware, particularly bouquets. On one occasion, it is related, his majesty was the victim of a practical joke. One of the exceedingly lifelike bouquets having been placed in his greenhouse by Mme de Pompadour, the king on his next visit to the place stopped and in all good faith attempted to smell the rare exotic.

The factory was transferred from Vincennes to Sevres in 1756, since which date it has sent forth works of almost inestimable value. Porcelain pastes, colored by metallic oxides, are now compounded there which resist the action of the most fiery furnace, and the enamels and glazes have a marvelous transparency and luster. Almost every tint which can be imparted to porcelain is here—white, turquoise, blue, all the greens, the delicate rose pink which has received the name of Du Barry and even scarlet, one of the most difficult colors to retain under the intense heat of the baking furnaces.

Sevres porcelain has always been an expensive production, for the most skilled artists have been employed in its manufacture. Formerly the finest pieces were made solely for royalty and were sold only by royal permission. The prices paid in modern times for some of the specimens have steadily increased until they have become staggering. Exchange.

CONCRETE LAMPPOSTS EFFECTIVE AND CHEAP.

Students in Seattle Make Interesting Experiment.

The University of Washington at Seattle has recently installed on the campus a number of lampposts which were designed and their construction personally supervised by Frank E. Johnson, instructor in the university. Seventy-eight of these posts have been placed in the most important parts of the campus, comprising about one-fifth of its total area, and more will be placed when a state appropriation has been obtained for this purpose. These posts are a university product through out, as they were not only designed by an instructor, but the entire labor was furnished by students in the engineering department during their vacation. And the castings necessary were designed and made at the foundry of the engineering department. The Portland cement used also was a Washington production.

The concrete was hand mixed in proportion of two parts cement to five parts gravel without the use of any sand. The pea gravel was hand screened through a three to the inch mesh, and all passing through this and caught on another screen of six meshes to the inch was used. After an average of eighteen hours from the completion of the pouring the molds were removed and the surface thoroughly wire brushed. After a three days' set the surface was then washed with one-half strength muriatic acid (commercial). When the cement was eaten down sufficiently to make the gravel stand out prominently the pole was liberally sprinkled with a hose.

Each subbase and the necessary wiring for each lamp were completed prior to the arrival of the finished pole at its permanent location. By reference to the plan it will be evident that the construction enables easy and quick work on the electrical connections without detracting from the beauty of design. The erecting frame and wagon were made at the university shops. The trucks support a weight of sufficient magnitude to require special construction.

WASTE UTILIZATION.

Pittsburgh Has Novel Plan For Using Refuse and Employing Poor.

A scheme for utilizing the city's waste and at the same time providing occupation for hundreds of persons is about to be inaugurated in Pittsburgh under the direction of the advisory board and finance committee of the Pittsburgh Association For the Improvement of the Poor.

The idea is to collect the city waste and have it sorted by an industrial branch for men. Headquarters for the work have been provided by Mrs. William Thaw, who gives the use of a large corner lot free of rent, together with a number of buildings which can be utilized for the work.

In these buildings will be located a waiting room for applicants and an office for the general manager, as well as rooms for sorting the waste, for repairing such articles as are salable and the display of these for sale. The contract has been let for a two story brick stable to accommodate sixteen horses and for a wagon shed. A fund of \$25,000 is being raised to start work on the scheme.

Shoeing Horses.

Horses were not shod either by the Greeks or Romans. The ancients were content with wrapping fiber cloth around the feet of their horses in cold weather or when it was necessary to pass through miry districts. Instead of troubling about horseshoes they devoted their attention to hardening the hoofs of their mounts. Nero, who ever strove to outdistance his contemporaries, caused his horses to be shod with silver, while his wife's were resplendent with gold, but in no case were nails driven into the hoofs. The practice of shoeing horses by driving nails into the hoofs was introduced into England by William the Conqueror, but was slow in winning favor.
