Pavement Laid at Moderate Price.

City Engineer T. M. Hulbert believes he has at last arrived at a solution of how to give property owners durable pavements at a moderate cost. Such a pavement has just been laid on Kearney Street between Fifteenth and Twenty-ninth street and property owners who fought every effort to pave that street on account of what they deemed the excessive prices asked by the standard paving companies have expressed themselves being entirely satisfied with the work.

The explanation of the reduced cost is that the old macadam base or the street has been used as a foundation for the bitulithic. Heretofore standard bitulithic has been laid on a base of crushed rock and in cases where the streets were covered with old macadam, the prop-

erty owners had to pay for the removal of the macadam and also for the new crushed rock base.—Portland Telegram

Gage Wins Suit.

The case of Joe Coach vs. W. W. Gage was decided in favor of the defendant by the circuit court last Thursday. The suit was brought for the purpose of securing a release of certain property levied upon by the sheriff. The suit involved questions arising from the purchase of the Club saloon in Bandon by Coach, there being some debt which the grantor should have paid before transferring the property. The bulk sales law of Oregon protects creditors where property is disposed of without notice to creditors. Under this law the court decided that the only manner of securing a release of the attached property was for Coach to pay the bills for which the property had been levied upon.—Coquille Sentinel.

Engine Breaks in Moore Mill.

The big engine of the Geo. W. Moore Lumber Co. Mill was considerably smashed up this morning, one of the cylinders being badly broken as well as some other damage done. It will necessitate a shut down of a couple of days or possibly more until the new pieces can be cast.

Many Assured S. P. to Build.

That the Southern Pacific will at once begin construction work on the line which is to extend from Eugene into Coos county and connect with the railroad to Coquille is the statement made by the railroad contractors who recently visited Marshfield. The party was composed of Chief Engineer Weir of the Southern Pacific Mr. Hitchcock, general manager of McArthur Bros., and Perks Company, the railroad contractors, R. B. Porter, of Porter Brothers, Mr. Dixon, a railroad contractor of San Francisco, and others. James Fowhys of the firm of Fowhys Bros. was in another party composed of Southern Pacific engineers.

The announcement came from Mr. Hitchcock who stated that his firm had the contract for building 85 miles from the end of the line to three miles which Fowhys Brothers are now building out of Eugene, to Coos Bay. The other contractors made the trip over the line because they expect to bid for parts of the work.

In brief, the statement made by Mr. Hitchcock was that the construction work would begin as soon as machinery and material could be delivered, that the bridge across Coos Bay would be built, that the line would extend through both North Bend and Marshfield and would connect with the railroad extending to Coquille. In short according to the statement made it will be possible when the road is finished to get on a train at Coquille and ride by rail to any part of the country reached by railroad.

The railroad men were highly complimentary in their expressions of opinions of Coos county. They all said that this community had a great future and that the coming of a railroad would bring thousands of persons here from other parts of the country.

The positive announcement that a railroad would be built at once has given a general stimulus to business throughout the county and on the strength of work starting at once preparations are being made for a good summer.—Coquille Sentinel.

Big Stock Show.

Portland, May 20th, 1912.—At a meeting of a number of those interested in the Pacific International Feeders and Breeders Show it was decided to make the following changes:

Name: Change as per letter head. The breeds have been included, and in order that the show shall properly represent the entire Pacific Coast, entries will be accepted from British Columbia, Utah, Nevada, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon and California.

Time 1913: The third annual show will be held December 3 to 12, inclusive. There will be no spring show in 1913. Feeders and breeders of the Pacific Coast are better equipped for competition at a late fall or early winter show than for spring events and it is proposed to make of the "Pacific International Feeders and Breeders" a Live Stock Show that will be worthy of the live stock industry. As heretofore, the show will seek to impart object lessons in live stock production—lessons so plain, that "He who runs may read."

Memberships: Those who hold memberships in the "Pacific Northwest Live Stock Association" will be transferred to the roll of the "Pacific International Feeders and Breeders Show" and a vigorous campaign will be prosecuted for additional members.
