

Obituary of Mrs. Mavity.

Missouri E. Mavity, a pioneer of Coos county, passed away at her home in this city, Saturday, May 25th. Mrs. Mavity was born near Knoxville, Tenn., January 23, 1833, being 79 years, 4 months and 2 days old at the time of her death.

She crossed the plains by ox team in 1854 settling first in California and later coming to Oregon. She was married twice, her last husband dying cleven years ago.

Mrs. Mavity was the mother of eleven children, seven of whom survive her.

The remains were taken to Myrtle Point Saturday noon, and funeral services were conducted in the Brethren church, of which deceased was a member, Sunday by Elder Thos, Barklow, assisted by J. W. Barnett, and interment was made in the Myrtle Point cemetery.
