Commencement Sermon.

(Continued from last week.)

After such an assertion, it is the most natural thing to ask about an ideal that is worthy of our notice. This, indeed is not the least important of all questions that may have passed through your minds as you contemplated leaving this institution and going into the world, either to help to make it or to further pursue your labors in the educational world; and in so doing it is well to remember that "No success is worthy of the name unless it is won by honest industry and a brave breasting of the wave of fortune."—Huxley.

In working for success it is well then to remember that our actions, words and deeds count in every detail. Men keep their eyes wide open to get a glimpse of our inner nature and as they see us there, they will judge not only us but what we do. "Whenever the eyes say one thing and the tongue another, a practiced

man relies on the language of the first."—Emerson. If you have been thinking of deceiving the world by saying one thing and acting another, you have chosen the wrong planet on which to act such a deceitful part in the universal drama; for surely you will be recognized before you go very far. Above all be yourself and in the fullness of that person fix your eyes on an ideal that will be useful not only while you live and act under it, but that will be worthy of another's imitation after you are gone. Many were the works written in the times of the famous English authors but only those that were possessed of such merit as will live while time shall last were handed down to the present generation. As for the remainder of the works we classify them with the ages before and in many cases place them side by side; and if it is true, as Carlyle says, that "Our own age will one day, be an ancient one; and have as quaint a custom as the rest, not contrasted with the rest, but ranked along with them, in respect to quaintness;" we should put the things into life that will last.

I fancy, as I take a glance at the boys who are lovers of history and worshippers of the men who commanded forces and made the world to tremble under the bloody heel of war. I can hear them say, Napoleon, or Alexander the Great, or Caesar, or Cromwell shall be the man after whom I will pattern my life, and then for centuries to come the world will know that I lived and did something to liberate the shackles of oppression of my fellow men. To such we might say, that this day and age will sooner or later have no use for such men because the golden rule set in order by the Son of God will alleviate all the oppressions of mankind and the kingdom of righteousness will dawn in which the words of Thomas Carlyle will be true. He said, "Conquerors are a class of men with whom, for most part, the world could well dispense; nor can the hard intellect, the unsympathizing loftiness, and high but selfish enthusiasm of such persons inspire us in general with any affection; at best it may excite amazement; and their fall, like that of a pyramid will be beheld with certain sadness and awe."

Imitation is the great characteristic of our life and in it we should be able to form an ideal which will please our several fancies and bring us the richest reward after our work is complete. We are admirers of men who have disciplined their own minds, and that admiration ought to mean discipline, and adoration ought to be translated into self suppression. To say that we admire beauty and yet remain unbeautiful, is more than a contradiction in terms—it is practical and reprehensible irony. To profess to reverence a certain quality of character, and yet to live under conditions which minister to a precisely opposite quality of being, is sure and intelligible and practical blasphemy. The most astounding fact is that men can look on beauty and think evil thoughts in its presence; men can go from the holy atmosphere of the altar and drink the poison cup of perdition; men can bow their heads as if in prayer, and raise them as if they had scorched in baleful fire. "This is the mystery of human nature! This is the enigma of the heart! This is the infinite perplexity needed the equal mystery of the cross to counter work its subtlety and undo its fearful shame! After all is said and the many arguments in favor of patterns are listened to, the one great desire of every life should be to be a man or to be a woman in the fullest sense of the meaning of the word. We become men and women, not after we have been disappointed in the chase of self pleasures; but after we have ascertained what impassable barriers hem us in through this life; how mad it is to hope for contentment to our infinite souls from the gifts of this extremely finite world. Manhood and womanhood begins when we have made a truce with the almighty, begins when we have surrendered to him; but begins joyfully and hopefully only when we have reconciled ourselves to God through Christ;
