WASTE OF SUPPLIES.

A Business Problem and the Way One Factory Solved It.

In one manufacturing plant the superintendent found that his men were careless with supplies. He decided that too much material was kept on hand in the shop. Mechanics found it an easier matter to throw away slightly damaged or spoiled work and begin on a new piece than to take precautions in turning out their work. He therefore devised a stores order which made every foreman responsible for raw material issued to his department. New material could not be had from the general store except on requisition, and the general store would honor no requisition unless it was O. K'd by the foreman. These lists were kept on file and totaled at the end of each month to enable the superintendent to make comparisons.

This put the foreman on his guard not to fill out a requisition for something which he did not absolutely need, and the first six months after adopting this rule expenses in one department alone were cut nearly 20 per cent with out sacrificing efficiency. The foreman also claimed that it had a tendency to develop his men into more skilled mechanics because they were under the necessity of accounting for the work they spoiled in machining.

The Postmark.

Great Britain, it is said, can, without fear of contradiction, claim the honor of having originated the postmark. The first one, which was used in London as long ago as 1660, was a very simple affair, consisting of a small circle divided into two parts. In the top portion were two letters indicating the month, while in the lower half the day of the month was shown. No endeavor was made to denote the year, and it is only by the dates of the letters on which the mark is impressed that it is possible to fix the date of its use.—London Standard.

OFFERS PRIZES FOR CIVIC IMPROVEMENT.

New Jersey Town Shows Its Progressive Aggressiveness.

Civic pride in the pretty suburb of Pennington, N. J., has caused the organization of a board of trade, which is composed of seven departments—local improvement, membership, publicity, grievance, house, legislation and law and entertainment committees. The officers of the board of trade are: Elmer D. Wagner, president; Dr. Edgar Hart, vice president; George W. Scarborough, secretary; Henry L. Lanning, treasurer.

The members of the board have announced an offer of \$400 in prizes for the ornamentation of the borough. These cash prizes are to be divided into two classes. One fund of \$300 is to be distributed each year among the residents who make the most meritorious improvements to their homes, walks, grounds, drives and premises generally. This fund of \$300 will be distributed on Sept. 1 of each year as follows: First prize, \$50; second, \$25; third, \$10; fourth, \$5; fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth prizes, \$2 each.

The improvements to be considered in the awards of these prizes will include the following: Painting, repairing, planting of trees and flowers, etc.; grading, laying walks and curbs, making grass swards and the general cleanliness of the property. The prizes will not be awarded with respect to the value of the properties involved, which fact will enable the owner of the most humble house to stand on equal chance with the person who occupies the most elaborate home in the borough. The other fund of \$100 will be distributed in prizes totaling \$10 every two weeks. This cash will be presented to residents of Pennington who make the most valuable suggestions for the improvement and advancement of the borough. The first prize in each instance will be \$5, the second \$3 and the third \$2.

The creation of this fund furnishes another example of the aggressiveness of the new board of trade in Pennington. Organized last fall, the board started out with the idea of securing 100 members. The residents of the borough took so kindly to the idea that already the board's membership has reached 103, with fresh applications being received every week. When one considers that the population of Pennington, according to the last census, was only 702 the numerical strength of the board of trade is little short of remarkable. The purpose of creating this board of trade was not only to make Pennington prettier and more cleanly, but also to urge better and cheaper railroad and trolley accommodations, the abolition of grade crossings, etc.

AN ARMY OF PECARIES.

Fierce Fighters Are These Tusked Wild Pigs of South America.

The pecaries of South America are formidable because they attacked their enemies in large bodies and with great vigor and bravery. The method and skill of their charges suggest that they are led by chiefs skillful enough in predatory warfare to direct the surrounding and destruction of a powerful jaguar.

The object to be stormed is surrounded in silence by a circle of hundreds of pecaries. At a given signal a simultaneous snapping of teeth occurs, which is followed by a converging rush toward the center. The largest and strongest reach the front first, and the smallest and weakest bring up in the rear. Those in front are pushed on by the mass in the rear, so that the enemy is constantly confronted by a rank of teeth, no matter how many he may have disabled.

An American engineer while surveying a Brazilian forest for a railway route encountered a herd of pecaries one night and with difficulty drove them off. His experience affords an illustration of the bravery of these wild pigs.

One day he and his party came upon a morass, the furrowed ground, trampled grass, turbid pools and phsy odor of which indicated that it was the headquarters of all the pecaries in the vicinity. But not a pig was to be seen. The camp was fortified. In the night there came an alarm. Suddenly from all around rose the sound of simultaneous snapping of teeth, and then came the charge of hundreds of black animals rushing toward the fort.

Guns were discharged, and the occupants reached down and slashed with their knives at the swarming pigs below. Numbers of these were cut down by the men in the fort, but others, impelled by those in the rear, threw themselves forward, ripping and slashing with their sharp tusks.

Suddenly the attack ceased. The animals had silently withdrawn. Then without a moment's warning came the crash of teeth came another wild charge, and the fight was renewed. Again the pigs drew off, and again they renewed the battle. Seven times they charged during the night, and not until daybreak was the last grunt heard.—Harper's.
