Commencement Sermon.

(Continued from last week.)

We may set up human standards that know nothing of the meaning of these words, and to which men will never attain; and if they do they will still be but human inventions; but Christian men will never hesitate to stand forward and say: "Christ is my Lord and my God: I cannot reach the sublimity of His holiness, but I can aim in that direction; I cannot overtake my own prayers, but I can hold my face toward the rising of the sun; I count not myself to have apprehended, but this one thing I do, I press, I press! The attitude is Christian, the attitude is an argument, the attitude imposes a solemn and incommunicable responsibility.

Although we cannot always so control circumstances as to realize an ideal character, yet the ideal itself must be held up and magnified, and nothing must be allowed to cloud the glory of that idealism. But to do nothing more than this they become mere ideals simply because we ourselves have not attained them; we may have made them ideals only by not attempting to realize them. The religion of Jesus Christ is full of ideals which are impossible of realization, still they are ever more appealing to us, calling us upward and bidding us welcome to loftier regions. It may mean a life of obscurity, so far as the world is concerned but as Macaulay says, "If we are unacquainted with the works of philosophers and poets, we may be deeply read in the oracles of God. If our names are not found in the register of heralds, they may be recorded in the Lamb's Book of life. If our steps are not accompanied with a train of menial servants, we are surrounded with a legion of ministering angels who have charge over us."

After lengthy speeches and much discussion this runs itself up in one single purpose—namely the building of a character which should be both strong and beautiful. Strong first and beautiful next, is the plan that God lays down in his word. Now in the building of character, while we all are aiming at greatness it is well to remember that a man is great because he takes a great view of others, conceives liberal things of God, and carries them out with both hands. To have respect for God and his word, to be blessed with a goodly portion of intellect with which to see the ideals which we have set up, and yet not endeavor to live up to them is a crime against God, and a sin against humanity at large and robs us of the real strength of soul. The character that is centered in the pleasure of God and has for its circumference a thousand points of human society where it does good is a spiritual unity, and is the fearful thing of the devil because it is solid, pure, noble and radiant, shedding about it the reality of its existence without being tried to find its genuineness. As the oak chooses the horizontal direction for its limbs so that their whole weight may tell, and then stretches them out fifty or sixty feet so that the strain may be mighty enough to be worth resisting—so should our character stretch out its divine roots to enable it to stand in the time
