At the school election yesterday afternoon, A. G. Thrift was elected a member of the school board for three years. Mr. Thrift takes the place of A. McNair, whose time expires this year.

The other candidate placed before the voters was J. L. Kronenberg, who received a strong indorsement by many leading citizens. Many who were opposed to the gymnasium thinking that if Thrift were elected it would kill the proposition, as Mr. Thrift is known to be opposed to it.
