The immigrant who comes here to find actual work by which to support himself and his family and who possesses good health and physical strength is likely, even if he cannot read or write, to become a better citizen and greater asset to this country than he who is highly trained and educated and who, because of this, assumes that the world owes him a living and who becomes a danger to society if that he not granted him in the manner he expects. Except at times, in the congested seaport towns and in the country during very limited periods of passing depression, the demand for workers of every kind continues, and if we desire the growth and development of our country to increase we had better be careful not to adopt a course which would be the reverse of the policy that has existed ever since the Puritans landed at Plymouth rock and that has made our country supreme and its people happy. Legislation that will keep out the physically weak and the morally unfit we should sustain, but any effort to adopt measures which may tend to exclude the healthy immigrant should meet with our most emphatic protest and legitimate resistance. — Jacob H. Notice of Change of Grade

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, did, on the 10th day of June, 1912, at a regular adjourned meeting by resolution duly passed, determine to change the grade on River-ton avenue in Azalea Park, from the west line of Spruce street running west to the west line of Aberdeen street in accordance with the profile of said grade by the City engineer, now on file in the city engineer's office, and is described as follows: The grade of the center line of River-ton avenue at the west line of Spruce street shall be at an elevation level with the top of the iron pipe at the east end of the base line of South Bandon and shall ascend 1 per cent. to a point opposite the line between lots 4 and 5 in block 9, thence ascend 2.65 per cent. to the east line of Aberdeen street thence extend level to the west line of Aberdeen street. Now, unless a written remonstrance, signed by owners of more than one-half (1-2) of the property affected by such change of grade as herein specified shall be filed with the City Recorder within twenty (20) days from the first publication of this notice, then the Council will pass an ordinance establishing such grade on River-ton avenue between points above specified.
