PROTECTION OF NATURALIZED CITIZENS.

No nation has from its foundation on frequent occasions taken a more positive stand upon the principle of nonintervention than the United States. This principle was developed into a policy by Washington, notwithstanding our alliance with France, and was emphasized in his farewell address. Yet no nation has stood more firmly upon the right of expatriation and the protection of its citizens, native born or naturalized, in foreign lands than our own, which protection has again and again been exercised on behalf of naturalized citizens who, returning to the country of their origin, have been subjected to pains and penalties imposed chiefly because they had emigrated and become naturalized in the country of their adoption without first obtaining the consent of their country of origin.—Oscar Straus.

GOVERNMENT OF CHILDREN.

The child who can rouse in us anger or impatience or excitement feels himself stronger than we, and a child respects strength only.
