Notice of Street Work.

Notice is hereby given: Pursuant to an order of the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, by resolution duly passed at a regular meeting of said council held in the City of Bandon, upon the 10th day of July 1912, in which resolution the Council did determine to improve Eddy Street, in the Fucher Addition, from the south line of 4th Street to the north line of 8th street, and directs me to publish the following resolution:

It is resolved by the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, that Eddy street, in the Fucher Addition to the City of Bandon, be improved from the south line of 4th street, running thence south to the north line of 8th street, that said improvement consist of grading and filling, the building of board sidewalks, to be built upon the established grade, and the building of a plank bridge for the full width of said street at a point between 7th and 8th street, all of said improvements on each side of said street to be made in accordance with the specifications for said work which is now on file at the office of the City Recorder and is open to all persons interested therein, the probable cost of said improvement is \$1,572.80, and the cost will be assessed to the property included in the following assessment district which is: The west one half of blocks No. 1, 2, 3 and 4, of Fucher's Addition to Bandon, and the east One Hundred and Six (106) feet of all acreage tracts lying west of the western margin of Eddy street, and to be known as assessment district No. 1.

Now unless a written remonstrance signed by the owners of two thirds or more in the area of the property within the above assessment district shall be filed with the City Recorder within 15 days from the date of the posting of this notice on Eddy street, then the Council will pass an Ordinance declaring such improvement of Eddy street to be made in accordance with plans and specifications as now on file.
