The Latest Arctic Exploit.

There is a thrill to the stories of polar travel and discovery for the reason that such travel necessarily calls forth the quality of human heroism. The story told by Captain Ejner Mikkelsen of his expedition in northeastern Greenland, when he was for two and a half years out of touch with human beings and was given up as lost, forms the latest of these heroic chapters of arctic adventure. The narrative itself is simple, modest and matter of fact, and it is only by reading between the lines that there comes a realization of the dangers encountered.

Captain Mikkelsen had but one companion, and the two were both ill at different times, Mikkelsen himself being attacked by that horror of high latitude, scurvy. Their supplies gave out and at times they faced starvation. Finally they had to eat their dogs and to drag the sleds themselves. When finally discovered their hair and beards had grown so long that the sailors almost mistook them and were about to fire on them as muskoxen.

The expedition was undertaken to discover the whereabouts of a previous exploring party led by Captain Mylius Erichsen. All that was found was Captain Erichsen's narrative, and this was brought back to civilization. His account, coupled with the observations of Captain Mikkelsen himself, will furnish valuable geographical data concerning a part of the world hitherto practically unexplored. Thus by the heroism and sufferings of a few men all men will gain in knowledge. But this will not be the only gain. Such examples themselves are priceless in the lessons they teach.

Notice of Street Work.

Notice is hereby given: Pursuant to an order of the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, by resolution duly passed at a regular meeting of said council held in the City of Bandon, upon the 10th day of July, 1912, in which resolution the Council did determine to improve Eddy street, in the Fischer Addition, from the south line of 4th street to the north line of 8th street, and directs me to publish the following resolution:

It is resolved by the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, that Eddy street, in the Fischer Addition to the City of Bandon, be improved from the south line of 4th street, running thence south to the north line of 8th street, that said improvement consist of grading and filling, the building of board sidewalks on each side of said street, and the building of a plank bridge for the full width of said street, at a point between 7th and 8th streets, all of said improvements to be built upon the established grade, to be made in accordance with the specification for said work which is now on file at the office of the City Recorder and is open to all persons interested therein, the probable cost of said improvement is \$15,722.80, and the cost will be assessed to the property included in the following assessment district which is: The west one half of blocks No. 1, 2, 3, and 4, of Fischer's Addition to Bandon, and the east one Hundred and Six (106) feet of all acreage tracts lying west of the western margin of Eddy street, and to be known as assessment district No. 1.

Now unless a written remonstrance signed by the owners of two thirds or more in the area of the property within the above assessment district shall be filed with the City Recorder within 15 days from the date of the posting of this notice on Eddy street, then the Council will pass an Ordinance declaring such improvement of Eddy street to be made in accordance with plans and specifications as now on file.
