FORM GOOD ROADS ASSOCIATION

Enthusiastic Meeting Held at Marshfield Friday Night Oct. 11.

Mayor J. W. Mast, Dr. L. P. Sorensen and Atty. Geo. P. Topping went over to Marshfield Friday afternoon to attend a good roads meeting which was held in that city, under the auspices of the various commercial bodies of Coos county, these gentlemen mentioned, being the representatives from the Bandon Commercial Club.

The others in attendance were: Mayor A. T. Morrison, R. S. Knowlton and J. E. Norton, Coquille; W. O. Cooper, Dr. Johnson, H. B. Stewart, Perry Ward, E. C. Roberts and C. E. Huling, Myrtle Point; Dr. Bartle, Peter Loggie, Edgar Simpson, Henry Kern, and L. F. Falkenstein, of North Bend; Mayor Straw, Dr. E. Mingus, Hugh McLain, J. A. Matson, D. C. Greene, Judge John S. Coke, Claude Nasburg and others, of Marshfield.

A permanent Good Roads Association was organized and Mayor Morrison of Coquille was made permanent chairman.

Those present favored bonding the county for 2,000,000 to build a permanent highway to the Douglas county line and induce Douglas county to take it up from that point and complete the road to Roseburg, so that there would be a permanent road from the ocean to the latter named city.

The feeling in favor of good roads was unanimous, the only question being the manner of going about to get them. Various phases of the subject were discussed by those present and it was finally decided to hold another meeting at Coquille next Friday night which is to be a public meeting and everybody in the county who is interested in good roads should attend if possible.

The idea of the meeting was that the county should be bonded for the improvement of all the roads in the county but the first thing is to get a good trunk line to Douglas county.

Parents Day Friday.

Last Friday was Parent's Day at the Bandon School and about 150 parents of the children were in attendance, visiting all the rooms in the school, listening to the recitations and work of the various teachers and pupils, after which light refreshments were served in the assembly room.

As was announced in a recent issue of the Recorder, another new teacher has been added, making 17 in all, and at present there are 540 pupils enrolled in all grades. This is the largest school in the history of Bandon showing the steady growth in population of the city.

"Women's Rights."

There are over 100,000 women in Oregon. The majority of them do not want to vote. A small proportion in any given community is asking the ballot. Is that not true in your town? What do the rest want?

Many of them are actively opposed. To put upon these women a responsibility from which they have hitherto been exempted and which they do not wish to assume is not "women's rights."

Many of them are indifferent. The indifferent male voter is one of the serious problems of the present electorate. Would you add to it a large body of voters avowedly indifferent?

The demand for women suffrage is the demand that women shall assume an equal share with men in the responsibility of carrying the government of the city, the state, the nation. It means she shall enter with him the political arena. For it is an arena. Politics is not a conflict of opinions, it is a conflict of wills. It carries with it public meetings, public debates, public marchings and counter-marchings, public discussions of public questions, and of the character of public candidates, and all the other incidents of a campaign.

It is not democratic, nor just, nor fair, to draft this large body of women into this campaign against their wills.

This is the sixth time the voters of Oregon have been asked to vote upon this question in spite of the fact that every two years the opposition to it has increased so that in 1910 suffrage carried in only one county in Oregon, and in that one by five votes, the total vote being 35,270 for suffrage, the smallest vote for it since 1900, and 59,065 against, a majority of 23,795.

To the People of Coos County County Surveyor A. N.

Gould's Statement to the Voters of the County.

To advance their own personal interests, certain of my enemies have attacked me through the press of the county, in a political "deal" to discredit me before the voters of the county in the coming election. In justice to myself, and the people both friends and enemies, I herewith make a plain and true statement of the facts in the case, trusting to the fairmindedness of each man who reads this statement to give me a square deal.

I hired my deputies at \$3.75 and \$4.00 per day straight time for any and all kinds of work in the field, for which I charged at the rate of \$5.00 per day for the time actually employed on said work, myself losing what time was lost in going from place to place, and collecting what I could, assuming all risks in collecting. The deputies were paid in full whether I succeeded in collecting the bills or not. In one survey in which the bills amounted to \$974.00 I have collected \$12.85 although I have paid my deputies for this work out of my own pocket.

The County Clerk of Coos county receives about \$1800 per year and the Sheriff about \$2400, and their deputies receive about \$1000, \$1200 each per year, I believe. The County Surveyor receives \$5 per day for the time actually employed. The Sheriff and Clerk contribute not one dollar for the equipment of their office, but the Surveyor must practically equip his office complete before he can perform the duties of the office. My equipment for the office at the present time consists of the following: Two transits at \$250 each; one level \$125; one typewriter, \$105; one blue print outfit \$100; level rods, line rods, tapes, drawing instruments etc., to the amount of about \$100, making a total investment of \$930.00 besides furnishing a team. The county has never paid one cent towards the purchase or repair on this equipment, but I have purchased and maintained this outfit myself ever since I have been connected with the office. Does any fair minded man think that in the law would require the County Surveyor to equip his office in this manner and then pay his deputies the same as he gets himself, when the other officers are furnished every thing connected with their office, and their deputies are paid about one half of what they themselves receive. The law does not contemplate any such injustice, as it is supposed to be based on justice to all. I have paid out so far, much more than the deputies have brought me, and if all bills were collected I would be but little ahead.

In hiring a crew on county road work it is often necessary for the County Surveyor to pay the men just as soon as the work is done, out of his own pocket and then wait two months before he is reimbursed.

I made a plain and complete statement to the Grand Jury, of all the facts in connection with the payment of deputies etc., and it seems to me that if they had thought I had acted dishonorable in any way in the conduct of the office, they would have taken some action in the matter.

In conclusion I wish to say that every thing in connection with the office, has been carried on in a strictly honest and straightforward manner, and I have at all times worked for the best interest of the people and the county at large.

J. O. Stemmler's Platform.

I believe in direct presidential primaries.

I believe in the direct vote for United States Senators, and until this can be obtained, in Statement No. 1.

I believe in legislation relieving the sheriff's office of the collection of taxes, placing it in the hands of a special officer, also uniform system of collecting, auditing and handling same in every county throughout the state.

I believe in a reasonable exemption of household and personal effects from taxation, to the valuation of \$500.00.

If elected, I will work for the abolishment of the office of County School Supervisor, as I consider it a useless expenditure of public money.

If elected, I will use my best efforts for the passage of the so-called Blue Sky Law, prohibiting the operation of the fake corporations in this state.

If elected, I will refuse to represent any faction, and will always aid any resident of the district in any meritorious legislation.
