General Felix Diaz, a nephew of General Porfirio Diaz, who was lately deposed by President Madero, has been captured, court martialled and condemned to be shot. But why should Felix Diaz be shot? Madero headed a revolution and deposed former president Diaz. For his success he was proclaimed a hero, elected to the presidency of Mexico and honored as highly as Mexico could honor him. General Felix Diaz has followed Madero's example; he also headed a revolution; but was captured through a deceitful ruse and now is condemned to die by Madero. By what standard right is Madero a hero and Diaz a felon? Both attempted exactly the same thing. Madero was successful. Diaz was unsuccessful. Is might right? Sometimes might is right, but usually it is wrong because power is wielded for selfish purposes. The execution of one tyrant by another will not remedy the evils for the people of Mexico. The Mexican people are boss ruled, and wickedly oppressed. So long as this condition exists trouble will exist in one form or another. The bosses should be put out of business and the people should rule themselves.

The eccentric Dr. Fordyce, a well known professor of chemistry of the eighteenth century, believed that man required only one meal a day, and for twenty years he practised what he preached. At four he would present himself at Dolly's chop house, in Paternoster Row, and immediately upon his arrival the cook would place a pound and a half of rump steak on the gridiron. While it was cooking the doctor would amuse himself with some such trifle as half a boiled capon or a plate of fish, and a glass or two of brandy. Then came the steak with a full accompaniment of bread and potatoes, and a quart tankard of strong ale. This was followed by a bottle of old port, after which he would stroll to his rooms in Essex Street, where he met his class and gave lectures on chemistry.

A factory to produce artificial rubber has been established at Ymuiden, the port at the mouth of the North Sea canal. It is said that the company instituting this factory has succeeded in producing a substance having the qualities of rubber and also certain special advantages over genuine rubber. The process is a secret, but the principal ingredient of the product is said to be fresh sea fish, which are brought to Ymuiden in vast quantities by the Dutch fishing fleets. According to report fifteen to sixteen per cent of natural rubber is added to the fish, and the result is a substance as flexible and elastic as rubber, but much cheaper—about as 1.25 to 8 in price, compared with real rubber.

Canada has the greatest railway mileage in proportion to population of any country in the world with possibly one or two minor exceptions and according to the Railway Gazette, she is probably about to enter upon an era of great additional expansion in railway building. One of the projected railways is to provide an outlet for the great wheat crops to Hudson Bay and thence by steamer to Europe.

Admiral Peary says that in some respects the old fashioned wooden ship is less vulnerable to the dangers of the sea than the huge steel liner. He once crashed into a partly submerged iceberg while going at full speed in broad daylight. "The stout little ship" (the Roosevelt), he says, caromed off the berg like a billiard ball, without injury; a steel ship would have had her bilge torn open from bow to quarter."
