How the Great Penguin Hatches.

The great penguin of the southern cir-

female lays two large eggs. The first

of thick feathers. It is there held close
to the body, whose warmth gradually
vitalizes the young bird. So tenacious
are the parent birds of this grip that if
you knock one of them over it will fall
on its back with its feet stuck stiffly
out, still clutching the egg to its body.

Preventing a Collision.
