New Lodge Law Invalid.

At Des Moines, Ia. last week Judge Bradshaw of the district court rendered a decision holding that the proposed change in the law governing the Modern Woodmen of America is a direct violation of the vested contract rights of the members and is null and void so far as it attempts to change the rates without the consent of the members affected.

The decision was given in a case wherein the insurgents asked the court to set aside any annual changes in the articles of the association by laws adopted at the head camp of the Modern Woodman of America in Chicago in January, 1912.
