Street Ordinances Passed and Bills Allowed at Last Meeting.

The city Council met in regular session Wednesday night with Mayor Mast and five councilmen present.

An ordinance was passed levying a six mill tax for next year.

An ordinance providing for the opening of Railroad street into First street was passed.

An ordinance providing for the improvement of Eldy street in the Fisher addition was passed.

The following improvement resolutions were passed: Columbia Ave. improvement from Iris street to second street. Riverton Ave improvement from Spruce to Aberdeen street, First street in the original townsite, hard surface paving and concrete side walks.

Three viewers were elected by the council to appraise the benefits and damages in opening up Railroad street. The viewers elected are P. C. Stephenson, O. W. Gibson and C. E. Kiepler.

Bills to the amount of \$867.00. were allowed.

There being no further business the council adjourned.

Returns Show Passage of Measure Limiting Bond Indebtedness.

IN DOUBT.

Grange road measure.

Apparently the Home Rule good roads bill has not passed in the state. This is the measure which was desired by the Coos County Good Roads association and which would have allowed the bonding of the county for \$2,000,000 for the purpose of making a permanent highway.

The voters have passed the bill limiting the indebtedness to which the county can bond for good roads. If the Home Rule passed it is said by some good local legal authorities that it would probably repeal the other limiting measures, but according to returns so far it seems that the Good Roads bill is lost and that the bills limiting the bonding have passed.

The Portland Telegram says: Governor West today announced that election returns so far indicate that four out of the six harmony bills may carry and also one of the Grange bills. They are: The bill providing for working of convicts on county roads; the bill providing for working county and city prisoners on county roads; the constitutional amendment limiting the state indebtedness for road construction to 2 per cent of the taxable property in the state; the constitutional amendment limiting county indebtedness to 2 per cent of the taxable property; the bill authorizing counties to issue bonds for construction of permanent roads.—Coos Bay Times.

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Pierce Wins by Five Votes.

S. P. Pierce is elected Joint Representative from Coos and Curry county by only five votes over W. H. Meredith. The latter was 12 votes ahead of Pierce in Coos county, but Pierce took the lead by 17 votes in Curry. The official count follows:
