Again the RECORDER would like to suggest the importance of agricultural development of the rich territory contiguous to Bandon, rather than new stores and business houses in the city. It is poor business to boom the town and induce new business ventures to locate in Bandon without a corresponding growth in the country from which its support must be drawn. There is plenty of room and opportunity for the development of agriculture, horticulture, dairying and stock raising in this section. Unless these industries shall be developed grass will grow in the deserted streets of the city instead of in the cultivated pastures of the farmer. The interests of the business man already here, who has worked hard to build up a legitimate and permanent enterprise should not be jeopardized or ruined by a boom, resulting in an unreasonable number of new establishments of like character. Such course can only result in general injury instead of good. Cities must be supported by the country. Unless the country is prosperous the city can not be prosperous. There can be no prosperity in the country unless the timber and brush is removed and the land plowed and cultivated. The present need of Bandon and vicinity is not more business enterprises of such kind as those already here, but farmers and dairymen who will clear the land and produce in abundance the necessities of life, thus making it not only possible but necessary for Bandon to continue to grow and keep pace with the country around it.

Attorney G. T. Treadgold says he knows enough to arrange the port of Bandon. Judging from Mr. Treadgold's speech last Thursday night at the meeting of the Commercial club, we believe he does. Those who failed to attend the meeting missed a great deal of information as to the organization, duties and responsibilities of port commissioners. Mr. Treadgold stated, that under the law, not to exceed 10 mills upon the assessed valuation within the port territory could be levied. He argued that there is little danger of wasteful and unwise expenditure of funds for the development of the river and bar as the people would practically elect their own port commissioners, having the right of nomination and vote in the election called for organizing the port. While the Governor appoints, he appoints those thus elected by the votes of the people. Men whose interests are identical with the interests of the voters would naturally be selected as port commissioners. Again: The power of initiative, referendum and recall being in the hands of the voters residing within the confines of the port territory, would render it highly improbable if not impossible for any port commission to impose to any serious extent upon the electors. Mr. Treadgold said that in view of the many decisions of the supreme court and questions which have been litigated, he thought the Port of Bandon could be organized so as to avoid the difficulties which some others have encountered. The benefits to be derived from the organization of the port are beyond computation. "The Lord help those who help themselves," it seems that Congress follows the same rule. When the citizens of the territory to be included in the Port of Bandon show a commendable and persistent purpose to help themselves, it will be consistent and reasonable to not only ask, but expect Congress to cooperate. The ability and energy of the gentlemen composing the committee representing Bandon and Coquille justifies the hope that the Port of Bandon will be promptly and successfully organized.

In passing out over the bar Friday morning both the Elizabeth and Brooklyn were seen to strike bottom. The bar was not rough but on account of shoal water both ships were really in danger of injury. At comparatively small expense the north jetty could be extended sufficiently to make the Bandon bar as safe as any on the coast for such ships as the Elizabeth and Brooklyn as well as all other other ships now making this port, including the newest and largest, the Speedwell. The bar is very short; the expense would be correspondingly small to make it safe. The Port Commission will have little difficulty in adding greatly to the safety and also the efficiency of the shipping industry of Bandon and Coquille River.

At the last session of the city council Mayor Mast found a new rule in parliamentary law. The motion pending was to appropriate \$104.60 to cover the deficit for planking Columbia Avenue. The vote of the council was a tie; so the mayor was forced to decide the question. He said that while he could discover no law that authorized the mayor to appropriate funds asked for in the resolution, yet according to the peculiar status of the situation he would have to sustain the affirmative or leave town. He sustained the affirmative.
