Bryan and the Cabinet.

It is said that Wilson and speaker Clark have been conferring about the cabinet. Bryan and Wilson have conferred. Others were being consulted by the president elect. It is the RECORDER'S opinion that if Bryan wants to go into the cabinet he can do so. Bryan is the biggest man in the Democratic party today. He has been whipped oftener than

any man in public life; but Bryan always comes back. He is hated by more politicians than any other democrat. He is respected by more democrats than any other politician. Why is Bryan hated? Because twenty years ago he was just twenty years ahead of his party; and the world hates any man who gets too far ahead in any direction. Mr. Bryan is not respected for two reasons; 1st his party has caught up with him. Secondly: W. J. Bryan is a man of integrity; and this is his most powerful asset. Bryan's administration would be straight forward, open and honest and he would win out, at least from the democratic standpoint. It is pleasant to record the fact that sometimes even in politics integrity wins over duplicity. Whether Bryan shall be chosen in the cabinet or not he has won out with the people and he has won upon his integrity as a man.

THE RECALL OF JUDGES.

Judges are not lawmakers. They are not administrators. Their duty is not to determine what the law shall be, but to determine what the law is. Their independence, their sense of dignity and freedom, is of the first consequence to the stability of the state. To apply to them the principle of recall is to set up the idea that determination of what law is must respond to popular impulse and to popular judgment. It is sufficient that the people should have the power to change the law when they will. It is not necessary that they should directly influence by threat or recall those who merely interpret the law already established. The importance and desirability of the recall as a means of administrative control ought not to be obscured by drawing it into this other and very different field.—Woodrow Wilson.
