Educational Notes.

(By County Superintendent Raymond E. Baker.)

The present County Superintendent entered upon his duties the first day of the New Year. The office will be open regularly on Saturdays, and upon such other days of the week as outside school duties permit. Any one interested in educational matters will always be welcome.

The eighth grade final examination will be held January 16 and 17, 1913. Teachers having pupils prepared for this examination should send in their requisition for examination papers at once. Each teacher should certify that every applicant has done the full years work in the eighth grade as prescribed by the State Course of study. No year of school work from the first grade to the last year in the State University is of more practical benefit throughout life than the last year in the common school. Don't let the pupils slight this work with the idea that there is something better to follow. The pupil who has really mastered his arithmetic and spelling book, who can read with facility and understanding, who has the historical and geographical knowledge of our country necessary for the duties of intelligent citizenship, has the foundation upon which to build a splendid education of whatever kind is best suited to his natural ability.

Every teacher has duties to the community in which she works that do not end when the door of the schoolhouse is closed after dismissal. What are you doing to help the social life of your district? Can't you start something that will be of benefit to everyone: a spelling school, a debating club, or a literary society? The schoolhouses belong to the people, and it is time that they realized that there are other good and lawful purposes which they may be used when school is not in session.

The New Year is the time for good resolutions. None the teacher can make will be more helpful than to leave out the non-essentials, and concentrate her effort upon the most important things to be taught. What Lord Bacon said about books, that "Some are to be tasted, some chewed, and some swallowed and digested," is a good thing to remember in using the Course of Study. The children will not have strong minds very long if their mental diet consists chiefly of fairy stories and other things which should only be tasted. Nor is there any need turning lessons into play for fear the child will not enjoy itself in school. Children enjoy work just as much as they do play when their attention is given to it. It is also a waste of time and effort to try to do much work in the other branches of study until the child has learned to read and write and spell well.

Many farmers move their families to town, build or rent expensive homes, and pay ten or fifteen mill school taxes when they might have just as good schools in their home district if they are willing to give the same financial support to the schools at home as they do to the schools in town. Country children are entitled to as good an education as city children, but they are also entitled to get it at home, just as the city children do. The lonely fire-sides and rented farms are a pathetic testimony to the power that the city schools and factories have toward depopulating the country. Think it over and see if this is not true.

Notice for Bids for Improvement of Curry Street.

Notice is hereby given: That the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, will receive sealed bids until 7:30 o'clock p. m. of the 15th day of January 1913, for the improvement of Curry street in the Woodland Addition to Bandon, Oregon, from the South line of 6th street to the north line of 8th street, according to plans and specifications for said improvement as prepared by the City Engineer of the City of Bandon and which are now on file in the office of City Recorder of said City and open to the inspection of all persons interested therein. The said improvement will consist of furnishing all materials, tools, machinery and labor necessary for the efficient and proper grading of street, the construction of wooden curbs, and the construction of six foot wide wooden sidewalks on each side of street, and the construction of crosswalks.

Bids will be received in accordance with the above specifications as referred to for the street complete as follows:

1. Price per cubic yard of earth excavation.
2. Price per lineal foot of curbing.
3. Price per lineal foot of six foot wide sidewalk.
4. Price per lineal foot of crosswalks.

Blanks for bidders will be furnished by the City Engineer upon application and no bids will be considered that are not made out on said blanks.

Bids must be accompanied with a certified check payable to the City of Bandon, for a sum equal to 5 per cent of the total bid as a guarantee that the bidder receiving the contract will within 5 days from the date said contract is awarded by the Council execute a contract in writing to perform the work according to specifications and upon failure to enter into such contract by the bidder said certified check shall be forfeited as liquidated damages.

Bidder receiving the contract will be required to furnish a bond to the satisfaction of the Common Council.

All bids must be filed with the City Recorder of the City of Bandon, Oregon.
