### Library Extension.

Our public schools are doing a great work, but after all, "the older generation remains untouched, and the assimilation of the younger can hardly be complete or certain as long as the homes of the parents remain unaffected." For those whose early education has been neglected either by reason of family circumstances or because of wayward disposition, and who realize their need before it is too late, there are night schools, business courses, and correspondence school courses, with the minor advantages and stimulus offered by public lecture courses. Volunteering study clubs and societies for research are being organized in great numbers. And, more potent and more forceful, more universal in its application than all these because better organized, better equipped and readier to avail itself of all existing affiliating agencies, is that national movement which has become known, for want of a better term as library extension.

Library extension aims to supply to every man, woman and child, either through its own resources or by cooperation with other affiliated agencies, which each community, or any group in any community, or any individual in the community may require for mental stimulus, intellectual recreation or practical knowledge and information useful in one's daily occupation.—Henry E. Legler.

### Lewiston New Milling Point.

Lewiston, Idaho, Jan. 25 (Special)—The Northern Pacific has made Lewiston an intermediate milling point for grain shipped from eastern points to the coast and the effect will be the opening of new markets to the local industries. The new rate will become effective on Feb. 18, and will place Lewiston mills upon equal footing with Spokane.

It is explained that large quantities of corn and corn products as well as hard wheat and hard wheat products from the middle west states and the Dakotas are shipped into the local territory and to coast points. The new rate will allow the local mills to engage in the manufacture of corn meal and corn products as well as hard wheat flour and become bidders for the trade in all sections of the northwest. The regular 2-2 cents per hundred milling-in-transit charges will prevail.

During the past several years the local mills have enjoyed a heavy flour trade at coast points and for exportation but some of the most desirable trade has been beyond the reach of the local manufacturers because of the prohibitive rates on corn and hard wheat from the middle west sections.

### Boy Scout Movement.

The Boy Scout movement is part good, part bad. What good there is comes from Ernest Thompson Seton, the American writer on wild nature. With real regard for the welfare of boys, he founded a society called Seton's Indians. Its purpose was to teach the boys woodcraft and many useful manual arts which require skill of hand, strength, and hardihood. This society was almost free from the cause of militarism, and it did not teach that slavish subservience to wealth and power, which is inherent in the Boy Scout movement as it now exists.

This society for boys aimed only to make them familiar with nature, and inculcate good habits of mind and body. This would have been welcomed by everyone, as it is well to correct the "stooping shoulders, the slouching gait, to train the boy to walk erect, and to be ever on the alert." Not only physically, but mentally alert, the danger that beset his path continually and be able to protect himself.

The bad part of this movement comes from England and General Baden-Powell is responsible for it. He wanted soldiers with physical stamina, but no brains. He wanted a race of men which should be strong and full of endurance while still satisfied with slavery.

The result of his thinking was the Boy Scout movement. Of course he must begin with the young in order to work out his scheme. It would never have done to openly declare his purpose, to train young boys in bloodshed and murder.

Such a hideous scheme would have shocked the nation so to cover up his real aim and carry out his plan, he combined his movement with that of Mr. Seton.

Mr. Seton's idea was carefully pushed to the front. The military object was kept in the background. People who are always easily deceived by rich quacks, took hold readily and swallowed the bait.

The real promoters of this boy scout movement are enemies of progress and the friends of capitalist tyranny. Their purpose is to break the will of the young, and prepare them for life long industrial slavery by destroying their capacity for thought, that they might hold them in slavery to their masters, the rich. If by his method of training while young, he could deprive them of their individual initiative as men, they would of course, make good soldiers. This movement prepares the mind for slavery, by false economics which is taught from the very beginning.

The boy is taught that all social misery such as lack of employment, poverty, intemperance and crime, arises from the bad habits of the working class.

The real cause of these evils, (the robbing of the producer) is carefully concealed. In connection with this false economic teaching, boys are made to swear that they will be faithful to their employers, that they will not take part in any political agitation against existing conditions, and in particular are they drilled in obedience to their officers.—A Mother.
