A Greater Bandon.

As has been previously announced in the RECORDER a large territory east of the old city limits is being annexed and as soon as the necessary ordinance is drawn and passed the new territory will be a part of our city.

This is a step in the right direction and speaks for enterprise and intelligence on the part of the people who are coming in, and shows that they are willing to help bear the expense of the benefits to be derived from a greater Bandon.

There is now a plat of land on

the south of the present city limits that should come in also and thus make the progress of the city, so far as new territory is concerned, complete for the present at least.

Truly Bandon is going ahead, and with the progressiveness of her citizens, together with the great opportunities for the future, we are certain to have a city here of much greater dimensions than our fondest hopes can at present realize.

There is but one thing to do, and that is for all to pull together for a greater Bandon.

Re-Naming Bandon Streets.

At the city council meeting Wednesday night the question of renaming the streets of Bandon, which the Recorder has been advocating for some time, was taken up. The special committee, appointed by the council, on this question, reported, with the assistance of the city engineer, the committee had a map of the city prepared, and in conjunction with the Commercial club's committee, had indicated thereon the changes in names suggested by the committees.

Some dissatisfaction developed with some of the new names. For example: Columbia Avenue was changed to Fir Avenue. Councilman Wade predicted that Bandon would grow to be a city of large size without doubt, and that Columbia Avenue would probably be one of the central business streets of Bandon. He said Fir Avenue didn't sound just right to him. Mr. Wade seemed to think that Fir was too common if not too plentiful down in

this neck of the woods, millions of feet standing as the stately sentinels of the forest awaiting the coming homeseeker.

Mr. Wade thought some name should be selected which would be consistent and harmonious with a great and hustling metropolis into which this little city is rapidly developing. The city limits have been extended since the committee's map was prepared taking in a large and important section on the east side and also on the north, across the river. These considerations made it necessary to refer the report back to the committee, which was done.

Some one asked the mayor when they should report again, the mayor answered; "as soon as God will let you." So it now seems certain that unless there shall be some hindrance by divine intervention, the street tangle of Bandon will be straightened out and we shall be ready for free mail service and other conveniences of a bigger and better Bandon by the sea.

A BOY SCOUT STORY

Have you a boy of your own? If you have, I think you cannot do better than to look into the Scout movement. He is sure to hear of it, and, if he is anywhere near twelve or thirteen, or fourteen, he is pretty sure to want to join it. I beg you, too, not to put anything in his way; and then, further, I beg you to keep your hands off. Your part is to listen when he talks to you about it; to approve; to have a good supper waiting for him when he comes back from his Scout tramps, and to continue to say your prayers at night for him.

For those who do not know and who wish information, I take the liberty of quoting without permission from the Manual:

The Boy Scouts of America is a corporation founded by a group of men who are anxious that the boys of America is to be built up in all that goes to make character and good citizenship.

It is obligatory upon the Scouts that they cultivate courage, loyalty, patriotism, brotherliness, self control, courtesy, kindness to animals, usefulness; cheerfulness, cleanliness, thrift, purity, honor.

The aim of the Boy Scouts is to supplement the various existing educational agents, and to promote the ability in boys to do things for themselves and others.

It is not a military organization, rather a distinctly place organization but so cultivating hardiness, readiness, and courage in the boy as to better fit him for war or peace, or, indeed, any emergency of life.

All Scout troops should consist of not less than eight boys, and all members should be twelve years of age or over. These are directed by

a Scout-master; that is, the adult leader of the troop, who must be twenty-one years of age. The Scout-master takes his directions and lessons, so to speak, from a Manual, the Scout master's Manual, especially prepared for him by the members of the Executive Board of the National Council of the Boy Scouts.

This Board and Counsel are composed of men high in standing, experts in their own line, so that by means of this organization the boy Scouts of the country are put in touch with the country's ideas and the wisdom of men who stand for the best and most American things. (To be continued)
