Parcels Must pay Duty.

Importations from Europe are now coming to Portland by parcels post and of course are subject to examination for duty at the custom house. However, some people seem to have the idea that because their importations have come over on the steamer from England, France or Germany by means of the parcel post they are not required to pay any duty.

Of course, like any unsealed mail from a foreign country, parcel post packages are sent from the postoffice to the custom house for the contents to be appraised and since the parcel post has been in effect in this country there has been on an average of from eight to ten sacks of this class of mail to go the custom house daily.

In small importations, however, there is an advantage in sending articles by this means, as the invoice accompanying a package sent from a foreign country serves as a declaration and after the package has been to the custom house it is returned to the postoffice, where the duty can be paid. This saves the recipient a great deal of trouble, it is said, and makes it easier for the customs officials to handle the small imports.—Coquille Herald.

Corn in Oregon.

That Oregon can grow splendid corn, ranking well with the best corn states of the Union, is the statement of C. L. Smith, agriculturalist for the O. W. R. & N. Company, who is arranging a corn show to be held next fall at Pendleton. This will be open to corn exhibitors by farmers in every part of Oregon and another show will be held at Colfax, Washington, for the farmers of that state. "Farmer" Smith declares that the average corn crop per acre in Oregon is larger than in Iowa, that corn is a plant that will adapt itself to almost any climate and should be made one of the chief items of agricultural production here.
