Mexican Situation.

Provisional president Huerta of Mexico is a traitor. He was one of Madero's generals commanding Madero's troops against the rebel General Diaz. Madero had once captured Diaz but mercifully spared his life. After a short imprisonment Diaz escaped and again fermented revolution against Madero. In the fierce fighting which followed in Mexico City, Huerta, upon whom Madero was strongly relying, betrayed his chief into the hands of the rebels, led by Diaz. Did Diaz and Huerta spare Madero's life as Madero had spared the life of Diaz? On the contrary Madero was treacherously assassinated at midnight by an armed guard while pretending to escort him to the penitentiary for safe keeping. Huerta and Diaz disclaim responsibility giving the lame excuse that Madero and his vice-president who was also assassinated, were trying to escape. The Recorder stands for fairness and justice. Madero fought fairly and in victory was merciful. Huerta and Diaz fought treacherously and were brutally cruel. The Recorder does not accept their weak excuses. They assassinated Madero after he had saved Diaz. They assassinated Madero's brother. They assassinated Madero's vice-president. They brutally and deliberately shot, one at a time, 90 poor soldier boys revolted at their crimes. Some of the boys refused to be blindfolded while facing the firing squad but stood bravely facing the executioners who were carrying out the orders of Huerta and Diaz. Thus far the Recorder has opposed intervention as a matter of justice and humanity; but if such terrible outrages are to continue the Recorder will favor intervention for the same reasons we have so far opposed it—justice and humanity and we think the limit is reached.

It is a fact that can not be disputed, that labor now produces from five to five hundred times as it did a few years ago, with the same amount of labor, by the aid of modern machinery. The result of which, is that we are now producing so much that we would be able to feed and clothe three times the population of the United States and are recognized as one of the most productive and wealthy nations on the globe. In spite of these facts there are hundreds of thousands of our citizens who are engaged in the production of this vast wealth of which we boast, who are actually homeless, and cannot obtain the necessities of life. While on the other hand less than 15 per cent of our population, who seldom if ever, do any useful labor, own and control 90 per cent of the wealth of the country. In other words, those who do nothing, have everything, and those who do everything have nothing. Can the reader conceive of any sane reason why we should build mansions for gamblers, thieves, grafters and spoiler, and jails, poor houses and penitentiaries for the toilers? Don't you think we have had sufficient reason to begin to look for the cause of these conditions and for a remedy? Do you know that at this moment there are nearly 500,000 workers on strike for better living conditions? And don't you also know that these plutocratic parasites, under the protection of so called law are shooting and clubbing them into submission as they did in Lawrence, and as they are doing in New York and other places? Ye Gods! How long will the American people stand for it? Abraham Lincoln said at the close of the war: "I see a crisis arising that unnerves me and causes me to tremble with fear for the safety of my country."
