News of the National Capital

Washington, March 17.—There may have been more successful inaugurations than the inauguration of Wilson and Marshall, but it is doubtful. The day was gray and overcast, but not raw. The absence of bright sunlight was grateful to marchers and reviewers alike. Of course there was a great sameness to the marching of the troops and then more troops, and the blaring of the bands almost every one of which insisted on playing a medley of southern airs in which Dixie, Maryland and Suwanee River were mixed up. But the crowds patiently looked on hour after hour, or until they finally grew too weary and hungry to stand it any longer and so melted away. Still it was a great occasion, and the tramping soldiers and drum majors, and the smiling President, and the crowds and the manly little boy scouts will live forever in the memory of those who saw that great show that we stage in Washington every four years.

BILLS THAT FAILED.

There was inevitably some mourning over the bills that failed to become laws. There was the shipping bill, which the President did not think had consideration enough, and the bill to protect Niagara Falls, which Senator Burton, of Ohio, was so anxious to see go through, and which he will at once take up again at the next session; and the Sundry Civil bill which would have carried joy to many had it gone through, and a good many others which there is not space to name. The Sundry Civil carried an appropriation for the San Francisco Exposition, whittled down its true from \$2,000,000 to \$500,000 and stripped of the good jobs for lame ducks, but

the Exposition will not even get that now, at least until Congress can take it up at the extra session. There was nothing in the bill for San Diego's great exposition, to be held in 1915, from January 1 to December 31. The city and the State are putting up for the San Diego Exposition, which will also have some of the most interesting government exhibits that ever went out of Washington. It is not generally known that the great National Museum is a veritable storehouse of wonders, with so much that has not been placed in the cases for exhibition that another museum like that one the public sees could be outfitted and then leave a great deal of material still unpacked. President D. C. Collier of the Exposition is assured that from this vast storehouse there will be sent to San Diego some splendid exhibits, and the cost will be comparatively small.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Oregon, will receive sealed bids until 7:30 o'clock p. m. of the 19th day of March, 1913, for the improvement of Second Street in the Breakwater Addition from the West line of Spruce Street to the East line of Bluff Street according to plans and specifications for said improvement as prepared by the City Engineer and now on file with the City Recorder of Bandon, Oregon, and open to the inspection of all persons interested therein.

Said improvement will consist of furnishing all tools, machinery and labor necessary for the efficient and proper grading of roadway to a width of ten (10) feet, and rip-rapping the embankment where ordered by the Engineer.

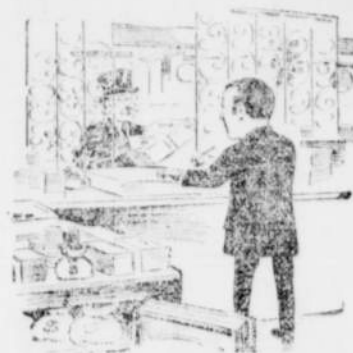
