A CONTRAST.

Two thousand to five thousand are dead in Dayton, Ohio, in a raging flood which followed a storm of clyconic character. More than one thousand dead or injured in Omaha, Nebraska, as the result of a terrific cyclone. Terre Haute, Indiana, is devastated by tornado and flood and hundreds have perished. Hundreds of millions of dollars in property have been destroyed in the storm which swept the middle west and the south. Many small towns have been wiped out and there is untold loss and suffering in country districts as well. The awful storms of death and destruction have started early this spring in the East while in the summer they suffer with heat and in the winter with cold. And yet there are millions of acres of virgin soil in Oregon and on the Pacific slope where such disasters are unknown and where the climate is uniform the year round. Oregon is as rich in natural resources as these storm swept areas in the East and is comparatively unsettled and undeveloped. Why are the people huddled and cramped in the thickly populated sections of the East under such unfavorable climatic conditions as well as unfavorable industrial conditions? It is because they are not aware of the more inviting prospects of Oregon other Western states. Oregon alone could furnish homes for all the victims of the devastated sections of the East and South. Oregon will produce the necessities of life under climatic conditions of safety and security, for millions who are now living in fear of life and property in the East. Fate has decreed that the Pacific slope will yet be densely populated with prosperous citizens, free from the fear of cyclones, tornadoes, and floods, because such things are unknown here. And home seekers are now coming. Two hundred and fifty colonists are arriving daily in Portland alone. Other hundreds and thousands are pouring into other cities in the West and they will continue to come in increasing numbers as the unsurpassed resources and unrivaled climate of the great Pacific slope, but particularly the Pacific Northwest, becomes better known throughout the country. The opening of the Panama canal will greatly add to the influx of settlers. Railroad development will build up rural districts by inducing settlers to locate along the railroads and the country contiguous. Oregon has a bright future. So has Coos County. So has Bandon.

One of the campaign issues of W. J. Bryan's, in 1908, was the guarantee of National bank deposits.
