SCOUT ASKED TO ENGLAND

Sir Robert S. S. Baden-Powell, chief scout of the British Boy Scouts

has sent an invitation to the Boy Scouts of America to attend the third national rally of the Boy Scouts Association of Great Britain in Birmingham, England, July 2 to 9 inclusive. It is likely that several troops of scouts will go from this country to England to attend the rally, and perhaps participate in the scoutcraft exhibition.

The leaders of the scout movement have asked that all scouts who are planning to go across this summer will try to arrange their dates to be in Birmingham during the rally. Scout masters should write to Jams E. West, chief scout executive, in New York.

The rally will have three important parts. There will first be an illustration of activities of scouts in honor of King George. Secondly, will come the display of the activities of the sea scouts. The third will be the scoutcraft exhibition.

The exhibition will illustrate the various industries and handicrafts in which scouts are obtaining proficiency. There will be displays of the work of scouts in carpentry, dairy ing, electricity, gardening, leather working, path-finding photography, pioneering, poultry farming and the like.

The scouts will camp out in Perry Hall park near the rally ground in Birmingham. There will be a standing camp for scout-masters and other helpers in the work. There will be a general camp for scout-masters and scouts who go to the rally. Tents, blankets, ground sheets and the like will be provided free, and food will be furnished at the lowest possible price.

STEEL FOR ROAD READY

A dispatch from Eugene gives the following information concerning the Eugene-Coos Bay railroad

"Thousands of tons of rails and bridge steel are piled up in the material yards of the Willamette Pacific Railway in the outskirts of Eugene and the work of laying the rails and building the bridges on the Eugene-Coos Bay Railway is expected to begin almost any day. Enough rails are on hand to lay the track between this city and Mapleton, at the head of tide on the Siuslaw river, but that portion of the road between the Noti tunnel and Mapleton is not yet graded. The grade between Eugene and the tunnel is almost completed and it is predicted that construction trains will be running to the tunnel inside of a month."

Notice of Street Work

Notice is hereby given, that the Common Council of the City of Bandon deems it expedient and necessary to improve First street from the west line of lot 3, block 1, Amended Plat of Breakwater Addition and the west line of lot 1, block 2, Amended Plat of Breakwater Addition east to the east line of lot 1, block 2, Commercial Addition and ten and one tenth (10 1-10) feet east of the west line of lot 3, block 1, Commercial Addition in the City of Bandon, Oregon, and on the 19th day of March, 1913, at a regular meeting passed the following resolution:

It is resolved by the City of Bandon, that First street from the west line of lot 3, block 1, Amended Plat of Breakwater Addition and the west line of lot 1, block 2, Amended Plat of Breakwater Addition east to the east line of lot 1, block 2, Commercial Addition and ten and one-tenth (10 1-10) feet east of the west line of lot 3, block 1, Commercial Addition to the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, be improved by grading the entire street between the limits above named, including the removal of all old board sidewalks, planking or other material now on the street, setting concrete curbing, laying concrete sidewalks, and paving the roadway with Gravel Bitulithic Pavement.

Be it further resolved, that said part of First street be improved by constructing reinforced concrete retaining walls as follows: Beginning at the northeast corner of lot 1, block 2, Commercial Addition and extending north 16 degrees 15 minutes east to the north side of First street in Commercial Addition, thence along the north line of First street to the southeast corner of lot 1, block 1, of the Waterfront Addition, also beginning at the northeast corner of lot 1, block 2, of the Amended Plat of Breakwater Addition to Bandon and extending north 73 degrees 45 minutes west along the north line of said lot 1, block 2, to the northwest corner thereof, thence north 16 degrees, 15 minutes east to the southwest corner of lot 3, block 1, of the Amended Plat of Breakwater Addition to Bandon, thence south 73 degrees 45 minutes east along the north side of First street to the southeast corner of lot 2, block 1, of the Amended Plat of Breakwater Addition to Bandon.

The cost of grading said street, removing all old board sidewalks and other material now on the street setting concrete curbing, laying concrete sidewalks, and paving the roadway with Gravel Bitulithic Pavement, it is estimated to be \$14,917.63 and the construction of reinforced retaining walls as herein described is estimated to be \$1,721.20.

The boundary of the district to be assessed for said improvements is as follows: Local Improvement District No. 1 of First street, which district includes all the property between the west line of lot 3, block 1, and the west line of lot 1, block 2, Amended Plat of Breakwater Addition to Bandon and the east line of lot 1, block 2, Commercial Addition and ten and one-tenth (10 1-10) feet east of the west line of lot 3, block 1, Commercial Addition to Bandon and extending on either side from the marginal line of said street back to the center of the block or blocks abutting thereon.

All of said improvements are to be built upon the established grade of First street and in accordance with the plans, profiles and specifications as prepared by the City Engineer and now on file in the office of the City Recorder of Bandon, Oregon, and there open to the inspection of all persons interested therein.

Any objection to said improvements must be filed in writing with the City Recorder by the owners of two-thirds in the area of the property within the above described improvement district within 15 days from the date of the posting of notices on First street by the City Engineer, which notices are required to be posted within 5 days from the first publication of this notice; this notice is published once a week for two consecutive weeks in accordance with Sub. Div. 15, of Sec. 102 of the Charter of the City of Bandon, Oregon.
