Loganberry culture is profit-
able when this delicious fruit pro-
duces as it did for a fruitgrower on
Mission Bottom, Marion County,
yielding 12,200 pounds to the acre
last season. These were the weights
given by the cannery where he
marketed his fruit. He was paid
4 cents per pound, or \$488 per
acre. About \$360 of this amount
was net.
