**Langlois People Want to Know What Commissioners did With Money.**

The Langlois Leader prints the following:  
"The people of the upper end of Curry county were represented last year by five Port Commissioners composed of E. A. Lownie, J. McKenzie and W. White, of Port Orford; E. B. Thrift, of Langlois and A. Adolphsen of Dsnmark. The two latter gentlemen were practically rendered powerless on the different questions that came up before that body on account of Messrs McKenzie, White and Lownie working hand in hand, voting down and objecting to any suggestions that Messrs Thrift and Adolphsen put before that body.  
"Now the Leader understands that a special tax of one mill was levied on the Langlois and Port Orford districts property to support the port proposition, which amounted in the neighborhood of \$1500, or thereabouts. Whether this money has all been used up or not the Leader can not say and would like to ask Mr. Lownie, who was secretary of the Commissioners, why he has never published a fiscal report of its receipts.  
"Just what portion of the people's money has been spent and for what unknown, but it has leaked out that of about \$250 remains or thereabout of the \$1500 collected as taxes. If this be true what became of it? It is said Mr. Peck, an attorney at Marshfield, was paid \$250 for assisting Attorney Meredith, and that the latter was paid \$300 for being assisted by the former. Is this true? But the most startling report is one to the effect that J. D. Goss, another Marshfield attorney, and representing the Smith interest in their fight against the Port, received \$250, either as a fee or as a rebate on his clients' taxes. How much of this is true? Let us have a report.

The general opinion in official circles is that the administration would welcome a test in the supreme court on the question of the eligibility of Japanese to naturalization. So far all decisions of record, mostly of western courts, have held that Japanese are not eligible to naturalization not being such white person nor persons of African descent as are mentioned in the naturalization laws as being alone eligible to admission to citizenship. The issue has never been tested in the supreme court of the United States in direct form. The Japanese contend that they are Malayan and Aryan lineage and consequently may fairly claim to be classified ethnologically as white persons described in the naturalization act.

**Survey Nearing Finish.**

A late issue of the Del Norte Tri-plate speaks of the preliminary survey along the coast for the Southern Pacific as getting along toward the finish, the crew working south from Crescent City having reached Damnation Creek.—Well, Well, it's too bad if the survey should meet its finish at that particular place. The surveyors on the line down from Siuslaw safely passed Fiddle Creek, Wildcat, Squirrel Ridge, Coon Hollow, Wind Creek and Dynamite, and we were hopeful that they would get through to San Francisco without encountering anything worse than Dead Horse Gulch or Huckleberry Mountain. Still, we of Coos Bay have great faith in the promises of the S. P., and if they "officially" announce that in their hurry to San Francisco by 1915 they will even tackle Damnation Creek, we'll stay with them until the creek freezes over, and then holler for them while they're laying the track on the ice.—Coos Bay News.
