**BABIES AT
STATE FAIR**

Portland Ore. May 13 (Special)—The "Better Babies" show to be held at the State Fair next Fall is already attracting much attention and promises to be the biggest thing of the kind ever attempted in the Northwest. Special prizes are offered for the best youngsters shown.

Every Grange, Commercial Club and school in the state is urged to hold local shows and send their best babies to the State Fair to enter the all-Oregon competition. There are no entry fees, but special blanks must be used for entries. These may be secured without cost from O. M. Plummer, Superintendent Eugenics Department, North Portland, Oregon.

To stimulate interest in growing corn in this state, the Oregon Agricultural College offers ten prizes for the best ears of corn grown by boys and shown at the State Fair. Entries must be made not later than September 22.

Trains will be running to Coos Bay in 1914, promises Vice President Calvin, of the Southern Pacific. The new road will give improved transportation to a district long with out railroads and is certain to add tremendously to the growth of that section of the state.

An Oregon lad beat the best record made in England in raising the greatest number of potatoes from a single tuber. An English boy raised 220 pounds from 11 potatoes and the English papers saw something in that to crow about. An Albany boy winning the state contest among school children last year grew 660 pounds from one potato by transplanting sprouts from the original, which had 12 eyes.

Klamath farmers are fattening hogs on their surplus potato crops. Ten carloads of hogs have been shipped into that district from Sacramento and if the potatoes on hand can be utilized profitably in this way, other large shipments will be made.

State Game Warden Finley plans a general convention of sportsmen for next Fall in Portland, when he starts to enlist the assistance of hunters and fishermen throughout Oregon to carry out the work outlined by the State Board of Fish and Game Commissioners. Delegates are expected from the various sportsmen's club in all parts of the state. It is believed that with the aid of these organizations, Oregon can be made the greatest hunting and fishing ground in the country.

Salem has started something new in the organization of a commercial club that will include in its membership farmers and fruit growers of the surrounding country as well as business men of the city. Probably no section of the state is in closer touch with its outside territory and such a move is of great benefit to both city and country.

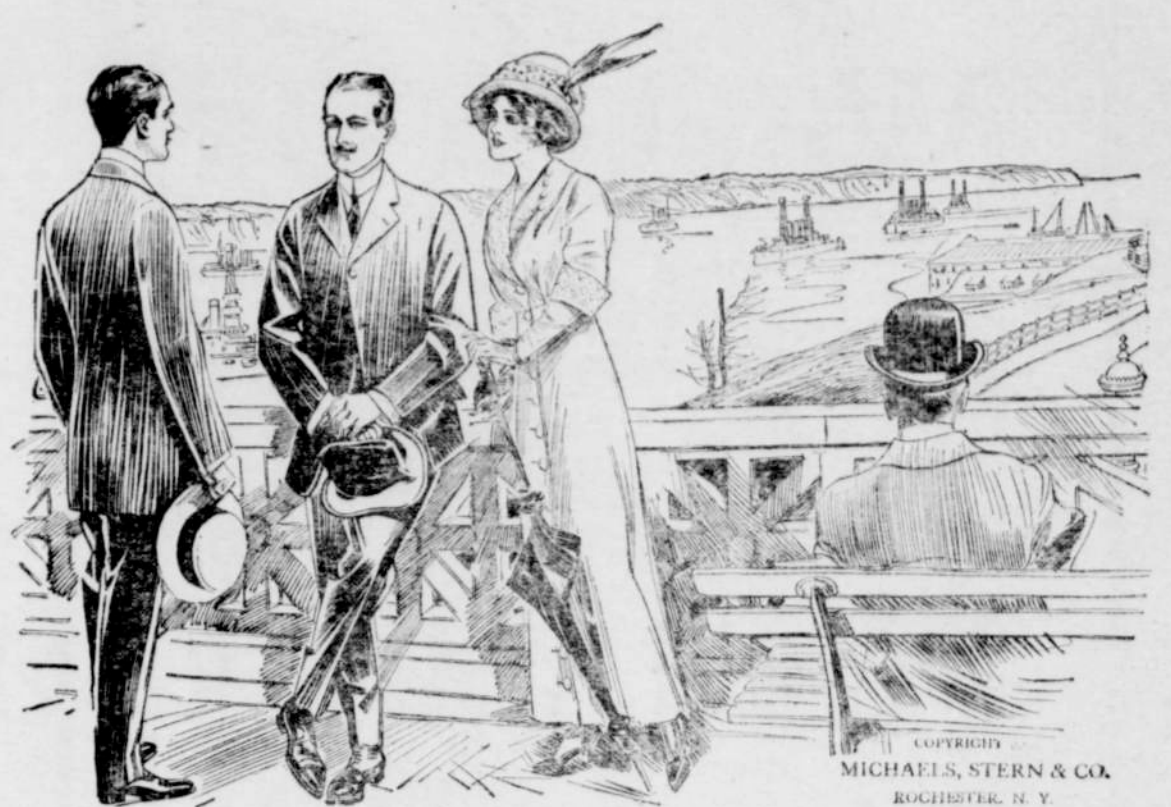

**TRAINS RUN
IN 1915**

Portland, Ore., May 7. Trains will be running between Portland and Coos Bay the end of 1914, thinks E. E. Calvin, vice-president of the Southern Pacific who recently took a trip over the new line being built to Marshfield. Calvin inspected twenty-four miles of the track which is being completed by Twohy Brothers, immediately west of Eugene and the tunnel at Noti, which now is virtually completed. He went west and south over the new road as far as Gardiner but did not go to Marshfield this trip, having visited that city and various other towns on Coos Bay that the new road will touch on an inspection tour a year ago.

For eighty miles the new road will be built along the water, Mr. Calvin pointed out, either rivers, lakes the ocean front or the bay. This work requires slow and careful construction. Speed therefore, is not essential factor and the Southern Pacific officials are not figuring on having the line finished much before January 1, 1915. The entire project is under contract, that on the western end being in the hands of Porter Brothers.
