So the People May Know.

I was not going to get into any discussion on the Water Question as I do not care whether the City buys the system or not, but as long as my friend Mr. Treadgold has taken the liberty of informing the ladies of the different clubs at their meeting last week, why they should vote against the purchase of the water system.

I will have to make some corrections.

In the first place he stated the rates were as high as they could be raised, that they were at their limit and the city could make us improve the plant. Now the city has nothing more to do with us at all, it is wholly in the hands of the Railroad Commission, to fix rates and see that we furnish good water, which we are doing according to the test of the State Board of Health, which is equal to 99 per cent pure. Can you beat it? Mr. Treadgold was asked if a private individual or a city could put in a system in competition with the one that is all ready here and I understand he stated yes.

Now, ladies and gentlemen, in the first place the Railroad Commission will not let a competing plant come in, and the law of the State of Oregon will not let the city compete. Now these are facts and if the time comes I will prove it.

On the other hand you can not blame Mr. Treadgold for not wanting the city to buy this system as he would like to get it into litigation, which is sure to come according to one of the councilmen's statement. Mr. Treadgold says we are overburdened with taxes, that is the reason he is going to vote against it. I guess he was not thinking of taxes when he was talking to the City Council and telling them what a good thing it was, of course not, I paid him \$25.00, that is the difference. Now Mr. Taxpayer, do you figure that this water system has an income? I will tell you it has, and under the City management you can build another system out of the present income without costing you one cent more taxes.

Now give this your close attention and if you do not see where the city would be better off owning its own water system, vote against it and if you do, vote 310 Yes.

Cranberry Raising in Coos County.

Cranberry raising in Oregon along the coast is developing very fast, and is an industry that pays well. Astoria has planted about two acres this year, and is coming to be front. The people there are beginning to realize that the peat bog is the home of the cranberry.

A few years ago you could buy the bog for \$20.00 per acre, today it is selling from \$250 to \$300 per acre. Why not the people of Coos county wake up, and not wait until outsiders come here and buy up all the bogs, of course it takes some money to put your bog in shape, but once planted, there is no more expense, and you will have a large income.

It costs \$350 to \$400 an acre to get the land ready for planting, this is an illustration. The first to do is to dig a ditch to drain. The next and the biggest job is getting the timber off, as there are all ways large trees under the bog, which have to be cut about 10 feet long so they can be handled, you will also some trees have been under the bog for centuries, perhaps, with wide spreading branches on them, which makes them very hard to get out you can't use a steam donkey engine, as they settle in the bog. The next thing to do is to scalp the bog, the next operation is putting on the sand. A layer of sand 3 to 4 inches deep is put all over the bog, this is to kill the weeds, it also serves to hold the moisture, and to warm the roots of the cranberry.

You can get the cuttings from Cape Cod or Wisconsin, or the vicinity of Long Beach. Of course if you can get the cuttings near at home, it will cut down the freight. The vines are planted from 9 to 12

inches apart.

They are shipped in barrels, which cost about \$2.50 a barrel, and weigh seventy lbs, it takes about eight barrels of cuttings per acre. It takes one man twenty days to plant an acre, and it takes three years before you get a crop. An ordinary yield of berries per acre is from 75 to 100 barrels. I have known where they have produced 140 barrels per acre, they bring \$10.50 and up per barrel. So you see the cranberry industry is a profitable one, you must find out the cranberry best adapted to your bog and climate.

I would like to see the people of Bandon take up this industry, as there are plenty of bogs near by, let us wake up for we have been sleeping long enough.—F. J. Engelke.

say about it. The water company at Marshfield is now before the commission for the purpose of raising the rates. Increased rates on the part of private water companies will be allowed by the commission where it is shown such increase is just and the city has nothing to say about it.

— WILL NEVER BE CHEAPER.

It should be remembered that the water system can never be bought cheaper than now. It is a property, which even without any improvements being made, will rapidly increase in value. The water rights which include the only practical available supply without going too far away, are inestimable in value. They will be worth a great deal more a little later on. The city should acquire these rights as soon as possible.

Coquille owns its own water plant and has made money with it. The profits are paying off the bonds. Bandon can do likewise.

The ladies will vote for the purchase of the water when they see that it is a good investment, a progressive move and a money making venture for the city which will not be a burden on the tax payers. They will also vote for it because they, more than the men feel the benefits in their household work of a good water supply.

AS THE MATTER STANDS.

There are a number of important matters to be voted upon at the election Monday and each proposition should be given thought and careful consideration on the part of the voter. None however are more important than the water works question.

The whole matter may be sifted down to a few questions: Will the people of Bandon take a step backward and turn down the proposition to buy the water works? Will they leave the plant in the hands of a private company which cannot be expected to improve as much as the city would? Will the people let Bandon go on record as being too

slow to buy its own water plant when the opportunity presents? Will Bandon stand behind Myrtle Point and Coquille in the matter of municipal ownership?

— WILL BANDON GO AHEAD.

Or will the people of Bandon see the opportunity as they usually do, and grasp it by voting to buy the water works now at a fair figure and before it increased more in value? Will they show that Bandon has taken another step which indicates that she is to be a big city? Will the people vote that the city own a revenue paying business which will always make money and pay for itself? Will Bandon show that she is a live wire keeping pace with other cities of her size?

It is safe to say that the voters at the special election Monday will do the sensible thing and vote to buy the water works. When the votes are counted out, it is quite reasonable to expect, that the result will show that Bandon people are to be depended upon for their good judgment in public affairs and that the city has taken another step forward in her rapid progress.

The contract for the new school building in Bandon Heights was let Tuesday evening to E. B. Fish, his bid being \$16,650 which was the lowest of four bids. The contract calls for the completion of the building by October 3rd.

The directors of the Bandon Public Library have been offered a splendid location on Atwater street for a library building, and the gentlemen who offer the location propose to erect a building well suited to the purposes of the library for a very reasonable rental. The board has the matter under investigation.
