

OREGON NEWS

Portland, Or., June 17 (Special)—Present conditions and future prospects of the business of growing fruits in the Pacific Northwest will be fully discussed at the convention of the American Association of Nurserymen in Portland June 17-21. Between 300 and 400 delegates will assemble for this meeting, nearly half of them coming from the states east of the Rocky Mountains.

A program has been arranged to include visits to some of the larger nurseries in this vicinity, excursion on the Columbia River and other features calculated to make the convention an enjoyable occasion for the visiting delegates.

If plans made by the State Fair Board are carried out, a notable exhibition of livestock and agricultural products will be held at Salem September 29-October 4 inclusive. In addition to the usual fair exhibits, there will be races, horse breaking, shooting contests etc., and in addition to these events, the Manufacturers' Association will have a place on the program and will make an elaborate display of the products of home industries.

The Western Forestry and Conservation Association has recently issued a bulletin predicting a dry summer and urging the utmost care and vigilance in preventing forest fires. Already about 600 men are in the field patrolling the various public and private timber holdings and more men will be employed from time to time as the need occurs. It is estimated that nearly \$1,500,000 will be expended in patrolling the forests of Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho.

The result of a college training is shown in the egg production of a hen owned by the Oregon Agricultural College, which laid 99 eggs in 106 consecutive days. The animated egg machine is three-quarters White Leghorn and one-quarter Barred Plymouth Rock and is a descendant of a long line of heavy layers bred at the college experiment station in breeding poultry for egg production will be embodied in a report which will be of much value to practical poultrymen.

That the dairy business in Oregon is growing at a tremendous rate and that in value it far exceeds the state's next largest crop, livestock, is the statement of State Dairy and Food Commissioner Mickel in a recently issued bulletin. The value of dairy products for 1912 was \$19,000,000 while that of livestock was \$12,000,000. Prospects for a material increase this year are good.

According to a statement by State Game Warden Finley, about 3,000 Chinese pheasants will be liberated this season in the various counties of the state, about 1500 of them going to Eastern Oregon. In addition to this increase of the game resources of Oregon, about 12,000,000 young trout will be liberated by the state fish hatcheries.

Consolidated School a Big Success.

A recent visit to the thriving little town of Bridge revealed something of the possibilities of the consolidated rural school. The history of this school in the past has been that of most one-room country schools, poor equipment, inadequate building and a constant change of teachers making any permanent improvement impossible. At last the spirit of progress seized the community, a considerable territory was united into one district, and a three-room school house was built. The board was fortunate in its selection of teachers the past year, and as a result the school has already taken rank with the very best in the county. The discipline has been firm but kind, the work thoroughly done, and the children have been so much interested in their studies that the per cent of attendance for the year has been 93 although many live at a considerable distance, and the roads are just Coos county roads. One girl has walked

3½ miles to school and maintained a high rank in her classes. The enrollment has been growing so rapidly that a third teacher is likely to be needed within a year or two.

An excellent water system is now being installed, with a concrete reservoir, a large tank mounted on a derrick, and a gasoline engine to pump the water into the tank. The water will be piped about a quarter of a mile to the school house where sanitary drinking fountains will be placed. The school ground is large and well fenced, and will be properly graded in the near future.

The board has recognized the conscientious work done by the teachers the past year in a substantial way, and for the next year will pay the principal, Mr. C. E. Mulkey, \$100.00 per month, and the assistant, Miss Irene Weekly, \$65.00 per month if she has the first four grades only, and \$70.00 per month if she has the fifth grade also. Everyone in the community is satisfied, and with the advantages of a good school, a church, one of the largest Sunday schools in the county, two stores, a creamery, a blacksmith shop, and rich agricultural resources, Bridge is becoming known as a desirable place to which to move and raise a family without the expense of sending the children away to school, and as a result is beginning to attract new settlers.

The school board of the Moon district, No. 22 has recently adopted the plan for an up-to-date one-room school house, using the design recommended by Ex-Supt. Fairchild of Kansas as the model one for rural schools. This building will have the latest methods of lighting and ventilation, the light being admitted only from the left side and the rear, with adequate cloak room and library. It is time the old "box car" type of school buildings was abandoned, and this school board is to be commended for their progressive spirit.

The county school superintendent has secured several good plans for rural school houses, and will be glad to show them to any school board considering the erection of a new building. It is time the old school houses, built 30 or 40 years ago, were abandoned for others more in harmony with the splendid homes found in our best farming sections.—Raymond E. Baker.

Upholds Oregon Law

The United States Supreme court has declared valid the Oregon law of 1907, creating the state railroad commission and also sustains the commission in its order to the Portland Railway, Light and Power company directing them to reduce by five cents, fares on the Milwaukee and Oregon City interurban divisions.

This decision by the supreme court forever fixes the power of Oregon to administer in a reasonable way the affairs of corporations against which public complaints are made. It is a big victory for the people of Oregon and gives the commission an abiding status.
