The Port Commission.

You will soon be called upon to vote on the Port Commission. The date of election will soon be set. Are you thinking of what \$500,000 will do for the lower Coquille water shed? It will create a demand for labor; it will create markets for produce of the ranches; it will increase the output of lumber and bring in hundreds of thousands more money than is coming now. This amount of money raised by a bond issue will start a development here which will induce scores of thousands of settlers to come with their means and enterprise and buy ranches and town property and these thousands of new settlers will not only pay the bonds twenty years from now but they will help you pay the interest. They will buy your ranch property they will buy your town property they will buy your produce. The government will co-operate and pour in hundreds of thousands of dollars more into the Coquille river project and this section will grow and prosper as it has never done before. If the voters turn the whole Port question down through an unreasonable fear of a little interest on bonds which, under the law, can not excess to mills, then what will happen? Ranch property and town property will go tumbling, few settlers will come here. There will be little demand for labor or produce. Business will go down in a little old rut and stay there and the lumber of the lower Coquille will go out over the Coos Bay bar. Coos Bay has a Port Commission, Portland, Tacoma, Seattle have Port Commissions. Every town on the coast that amounts to anything has a Port Commission. Every town on the coast that expects to ever amount to anything is looking forward to the creations of a Port Commission. Now is the time for the people of this water shed to act. The opportunity has arrived. Will we be as wide awake and enterprising as the people of other sections? Get in the campaign and talk it over with your neighbor. A campaign of education is necessary. Every one is equally interested. There are no salaries and no commissions to any one. It is a question of general growth and prosperity or general stagnation and decay. Which shall it be?

Six Acres of Strawberries.

H. L. Varney is probably one of the busiest men in this neck-o'-the-woods just now. Mr. Varney has six acres planted to strawberries, and although but two acres are in bearing he is picking—and has been for the past 16 days—an average of 50 crates per day. Some of the pearing plants are fully two feet across at the top, and are literally born down by the weight of the berries, which are large and luscious in numerous instances less than 25 berries fill a box, and in one particular instance 11 heaped a quart box. The four additional acres will be in bearing next season. Mr. Varney has an aggregate of 27,600 plants. At present he is shipping to Bandon. —Coquille Sentinel.

To Stop Betting

Sheriff Gege and Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Liljequist will be asked by the Coquille Base Ball Club to enforce the new rule against betting on the grounds. The Coquille diamond is outside the city limits of Coquille and the city authorities will not be able to enforce the law, but the county authorities can.

The rule against betting has been adopted by the Coquille Club to prevent rowdism at the games. The management decided that most of the trouble started from people betting who could not afford to and that the wrangles were over the bets instead of the game itself. If people place bets on the game before it starts, the club cannot interfere but if there is an exchange of bets on the grounds, the parties making the wagers can be punished under the law prohibiting gambling. —Marshfield Times.

Canada will begin construction of the Hudson Bay Railroad about July 1 and will dredge a ship channel fifteen miles long to Port Nelson, which is to be the terminus. As the road will at first be dependent almost solely on wharf traffic for export and as the bay will be open to navigation only a few months each year. Probably after harvest each year wheat will be rushed to the sea board, stored there in great elevators and exported when the ice melts in the Spring. This method of handling will eat up much of the saving due to the short railroad haul.

Notice is hereby given: That the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, deems it expedient and necessary to improve Twelfth Street West from the East line of Jackson Avenue, where Twelfth Street intersects said Jackson Avenue running thence East to the East line of Morris Addition to Bandon, Oregon, at the cost and expense of the owners of the lots, parts of lots and tracts of land included in the improvement district to be known as "Local Improvement District No. 5 of Twelfth Street, which district embraces all of the property on either side of said Twelfth Street between the East line of Jackson Avenue and the East line of Morris Addition, from the marginal line of said Twelfth Street back to the center of the block or blocks abutting thereon. Notice of Assessments for Extension of Railroad Street into First Street in the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon.

Notice is hereby given: That at a regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, held upon the 14th day of May 1913, Ordinance No. 263 entitled, "An Ordinance adopting the report of the viewers appointed by the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Oregon, to view the proposed extension of Railroad Street into First Street in the said City of Bandon, and to make an assessment of the damages and benefits of said extension to the respective owners of property affected by such extension," was duly passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor on said date, which Ordinance directs me to enter the said assessments in the Docket of City Liens and from the date of the entry thereof in said Docket of City Liens the sum as entered against each lot or parcel of land, becomes and is a lien upon such lot or parcel of land, and unless the assessment is paid within the time prescribed by the Charter of the City of Bandon, Oregon, the lot or parcel of land so assessed will be sold to pay the assessment interest and cost. The whole cost of the extension of Railroad Street into First Street in the City of Bandon, Oregon, is \$10,908.23 and the boundaries of the district assessed for the cost of the same commences at the West line of Spruce Street (Now Edison Ave.) running thence East to the East line of Columbia Ave. (Now Fillmore Ave.) upon all lots, parts of lots and tracts of land abutting upon First Street and Railroad Street (Now First Street East and First Street West) and upon other lots, on said street assessed with like benefits as set out in the report of the viewers and adopted by the Common Council which is now on file with the City Recorder.
