**Stockmen Must Obey New Law.**

The new state veterinarian and ex-officio live stock inspector for this state is Dr. W. H. Lytle of Pendleton, who was appointed by the state live stock sanitary board when it met at the capitol last week and organized by selecting Charles Cleveland of Gresham as chairman. The board was created by an act of the last legislature.

One of the first acts of the new board was to adopt a resolution calling upon the governor to issue a proclamation to the effect that all horses and mules being shipped into the state must first be subjected to the Mallein or other tests to prove their freedom from glanders; and another that all hogs shipped into the state must be immunized by the Dorset-McBrude-Niles serum.

Another action of precaution against the spread of hog cholera was taken by making a rule that all hotel and refuse must be cooked before being fed to hogs.

The state veterinarian was authorized to appoint deputy veterinarians throughout the state to test the animals being shipped out of the state. For this service they will be paid by the stock owners.

Within the next two weeks the board will hold its second meeting

for the purpose of promulgating rules for the regulation of dairies, and prescribing other rules of sanitation

**College Foundry Saves State Money.**

More than \$800 has been saved the state by one piece of work in the foundry of the Oregon Agricultural College, for, under the direction of A. E. Ridenour, instructor in foundry practice, the students have made the castings for the brackets to carry the pipes to be placed in the tunnel for the extension of the heating plant and the manhole rings and covers.

During the year the foundry has made fourteen runs, aggregating nine tons of good casting. These were used in the shops, in repair work, and in making new machines and equipment for various departments of the college. Thus fourteen departments were served during the college year, including the dairy agriculture, chemistry, experimental engineering, the various shops, physical training and others.

During the two semesters 59 students were enrolled in the work in the foundry, an excellent showing for a department just installed two years ago. They get a training here that prepares them to do good work giving them a foundation such as will enable them to become proficient in a short time in case they desire to go into other foundries.—Oregon Manufacturer.
