

STAY SENTENCE FOR APPEAL

Coquille, Ore., July 8.—One to ten years in state's prison was the sentence imposed by Judge J. S. Coke here yesterday on State Representative J. S. Barton, who was recently convicted of attempted criminal assault on Miss Yoakam, an employe in Mr. Barton's office. The penalty for the crime was fixed by statute. C. F. McKnight, attorney for Mr. Barton, said that he had nothing to say in behalf of his client, as the statute fixed the punishment as an indeterminate sentence. In imposing sentence Judge Coke said that there was some question as to the sufficiency of the evidence in establishing the severer crime, but as the jury had said that the evidence was sufficient, he could not go back of it. He again referred to the testimony of the principals in the case and scored Mr. Barton for the evidence he had given.

Upon request, a stay of execution of the sentence was granted to permit an appeal to the Oregon Supreme Court. This appeal will be taken at once, but it will probably be a year or so before the higher court finally passes on the case and meantime Mr. Barton will be allowed his freedom under bond.

Judge Coke also denied a new trial in the case of Geo. Goodrum vs. W. B. Cox. This involved the ownership of an auto which Mr. Cox, as constable, had attached on a mechanic's lien filed by Fred Nelson, of Marshfield. The auto had been sold on a contract to "Slim" Wilson, of Marshfield, and the latter had Nelson make certain repairs on it. Later the auto reverted to Goodrum and Nelson tried to hold the machine for the repair bill.—Coos Bay Times.

OREGON NEWS

Portland, Ore., July 8, (Special).—During the past week a month gathering, under the auspices of the National Reform Association, has been holding a series of meetings in the stadium of the Multnomah Athletic Club. At these meetings noted speakers from all parts of the world have been heard, missionaries, pastors, educators, moral reformers and other leaders of Christian thought and action.

Among the foreign countries represented at the conference are: Norway, Turkey, Japan, China, New Zealand, Korea, Ireland, Scotland, Germany, France Italy. The addresses of these noted leaders in modern reforms have been listened to by crowds which filled the immense open air auditorium to full capacity. It is probable that the next conference will be held in 1915 and it is almost certain that San Francisco will be chosen as its location.

The following letter has been received from the Coquille Commercial Club: 'Coquille wants some help in getting contractors to clear 1500 acres of willow bottom land directly across the river from the city. It is fine bottom land owned by Californians who offer \$18 per acre for brushing and burning, and if the 1500 acres can be cleared, it will be put on the market at \$150 per acre, which is cheap as land goes in this section.'

The time is now ripe for the various communities in the state to become active in selecting samples of grains, vegetables, fruits, etc., for displays to be made at the various Eastern land shows this fall and winter. Sutherland reports a fine collection under way, and it is hoped that every section of Oregon will come to the front with a liberal quantity of their best products. No amount of written or printed boosting can be as effective as a well staged display of the actual products of Oregon gardens and ranches.

A few days ago contracts were let at Medford for the construction of a \$40,000 pre-cooling and storage plant, the contract calling for its completion by the 15th of August, in time for the first shipment of pears. The building is to be 80 by 124 feet in size and will have a capacity of 100 carloads.

As a fitting culmination to the weeks of hard work Portland school children have given their school gardens, a school-garden market has been opened at First and Stark streets at which the produce from their small farms can be turned into hard cash. Under the plan adopted each boy or girl becomes a merchant, brings the vegetables to the market sells to the best advantage and receives 90 percent of the proceeds, 10 percent going toward the rental and other expenses of the market.

In a recent interview James J. Hill stated that the agricultural territory in the Northwest served by his railroads will go far towards bringing the value of soil products in the United States up to the ten billion dollar point.

Spokane Will Curb Noise.

Spokane, Wash., July 3.—(Special).—The city's new criminal code was adopted today by the City Council after a strong provision prohibiting unnecessary noises in the city had been inserted.

The code as adopted combines about 40 to 50 per cent of the existing ordinances, incorporates the entire state criminal code, covering misdemeanors and adds several new laws covering petty offenses.
