Florence Postmaster Resigns

After serving as postmaster of Florence for over 25 years, William Kyle, a few days ago tendered his resignation and will retire from the office as soon as his successor is appointed and qualified, says the Florence West.

Mr. Kyle was appointed postmaster in November, 1881, succeeding O. W. Hurd and held the position continuously since that time. He gives up now on account of the pressure of his private business. He is the third man to hold the position since the Florence office was established some 32 years ago. The others are A. J. Moody (deceased) and O. W. Hurd.

There are few if any postmasters in Oregon who have served continuously for a longer time than Mr. Kyle and his accounts were always found in good order. — Marshfield Times.

Notice is hereby given, That by authority of a majority vote of the legal voters present at a legally called school meeting of School District Number 54, of Coos County, Oregon, held in said district, on the 21st day of February, 1913, the district school board of said district will between the 10th day of July, 1913, and the 15th day of July, 1913, contract a debt not to exceed five per centum of the value of the taxable property of the district, for the purpose of raising funds to build the East side school building and will for such purpose offer for sale \$17000 of negotiable interest bearing warrants, on the district, drawing 6 per cent interest warrants for said amount to be divided into 4 series of \$4250 each, running 5, 6, 7, and 8 years, respectively, and each bona-fide resident citizen of such district shall have the right to subscribe once for said loan, for the entire amount or any portion of the same, not less than \$50.00 at par value warrants to be issued to the smallest subscriber or subscribers first one warrant to each said subscriber (if within one series) upon payment of the amount subscribed in lawful money of the United States, until the entire loan has been placed and after each bona-fide resident of the district has had opportunity to subscribe for such loan and the same has all been taken and issued to such subscribers or in case the subscribers do not call for the same within three days after the time fixed for the delivery of the said warrants, of the district, the district board will permit others of such subscribers to make further subscriptions in the same manner as heretofore provided in this notice until all the loan has been taken and in accordance with the provisions of law governing the same.
