

OREGON NEWS

Portland, Ore. July 15. (Special)—In order to arouse interest in the meeting of the Oregon Development League to be held August 19, 21, at Klamath Falls and to personally carry a cordial and urgent invitation to the business men and ranchers to attend that convention. A party representing the Portland Commercial Club, the railroads and the newspapers is now making an automobile tour of Central Oregon and will devote all of this week and next to a series of meetings for the purpose of securing delegates to the O. D. L. gathering. The party left Portland last Sunday for Bend, the latter being the real starting point of the tour, being preceded by a letter addressed to every commercial organization in the territory to be covered giving the itinerary in detail. This advance notice will enable each community to make preparation for a large attendance at the meetings to be held on arrival of the party. It is hoped that the excursion will result in securing information which will enable the Oregon Agricultural College and the Portland Commercial Club to help Central Oregon in the development of its resources.

The cannery of the Fruit Growers' Association at Eugene, is running to full capacity and 24 quarts of loganberries or raspberries are being turned out for every minute of the working day. Due to increased acreage and unusually favorable weather conditions the berry crop in the Eugene district is unusually large this year.

Writing from La Grande, H. C. Maris, a field worker of the Oregon Agricultural College, states that the citizens of the different sections of Union County are co-operating in an effort to make their county fair a record breaker in every respect this year. They propose to get together an exhibit at La Grande, October 8, 11, that will convince their own citizens, as well as all visitors that Union is second to no other county in the state in agricultural production. Industrial, agricultural and horticultural exhibits staged by the children of the county will be made a prominent feature of the fair.

In order to protect the seeds of Douglas Fir that will be planted during this summer, a campaign of extermination will be waged against field mice and other rodents in the burned burned over sections of Tillamook County, and poisoned grain will be liberally scattered over a tract of about 2,000 acres to be reforested. As so as the poison crew finishes its work, a force of men will be sent to do the seeding, a task which will require about three months. In addition to the 2,000 acres to be seeded, an additional 1,000 acres will be planted with young trees.

Visitors to the world's fair at San Francisco in 1915 will be reminded the Southern Pacific that Oregon is "one of the sights you can't afford to miss." As a result of a series of conferences recently held between the officials of that line, the "Shasta Route," the line between Portland and Sacramento, will be widely exploited. Crater Lake, the great fruit orchards of Southern Oregon, the Willamette Valley, the grand scenery of the Cascades and the varied industries of Western Oregon will be made the subjects of pictures and stories to induce tourists to include a trip through Oregon in their exposition plans.

I am moved by the recent lawlessness which has marked the civic life of Bandon to inquire whether or not the city government which was elected to maintain law and order and otherwise look after the public interests has resigned or gone on a vacation.

A short time ago an unpopular baseball player was run out of town. He may have been altogether bad, but it was someones business to give him better protection than he received.

On the Fourth of July the saloons

had doors wide open. Possibly the patriotic proprietors kept open house solely to dispense free lunches but have my doubts. The mayor was so busy pulling off athletic stunts, he could not be expected to notice a little matter of that kind, but surely it was someones business to see that the law was observed.

Here last week a man whose only offense, according to your columns, was that he displeased certain people by his published utterances and that he was suspected of being an I. W. W. was driven from town by a mob of two hundred men. Such proceedings raise a whole bunch of questions. Who is running things in Bandon anyhow? Has a man not a right to freely express his opinions, providing they are not libelous or obscene? There is no crime even in being an I. W. W. is there? If Dr. Leach had committed any offense against society there was a legal and orderly way to proceed against him. Under what authority did Mr. Bedillion and Mr. Fish and the others constitute themselves judge and jury? Must I or anyone else who writes or speaks to the Bandon public consult the opinions and prejudices of these gentlemen or run the risk of being mobbed?

Do these men realize, orderly as they may have behaved, that their act was an act of anarchy. In their ten minutes work they did more to promote the spread of the I. W. W. than Dr. Leach could have done in ten years of undisturbed propaganda, supposing he was trying to do so.

If a case of industrial turmoil should occur in Bandon and the mills were in danger of damage, who would shout loudest for the police and the militia to maintain law and order. It would be the very men who last week took the law in their own hands and ordered a man out of town for being an agitator offensive to themselves.

Even though I am not a resident of Bandon, this is my business and every mans business, who believes in the freedom of the press and the freedom of speech. So long as Dr. Leach did not ever step the limits of the law he had every right to speak or write as he pleased: It is my right it is your right. Furthermore he was entitled to protection in the exercise of that right. The attack upon him, in my opinion was nothing less than cowardly and lawless. I am against anarchy, even by leading citizens.—Frank F. Eddy

CHAMP CLARK MAKES DENAL

Washington, July, 11. Speaker Clark made a statement before the Senate lobby committee today relating to the use of his name by David Lamar and Edward Lauterbach.

Clark said: "I never spoke to J. Pierpont Morgan or any member of his firm in my life. I never communicated with him or them, in any manner whatsoever, and never authorized anybody else to do so. I was, to my best knowledge and belief, never introduced even casually to him or any of them. To my best knowledge and belief I never saw any of them except Morgan himself, and that was across a large dining room at the New Willard Hotel at a Gridiron Club banquet. I was, several years ago, introduced to Lauterbach here in Washington in the presence of several gentlemen and passed the usual salutations with him. I never saw him before or since, and never communicated with him in any manner whatsoever about any business matter whatsoever.

"I had never heard of Lamar, and knew him only by seeing his name in the papers that there was such a man as Lewis Cass Ledyard."

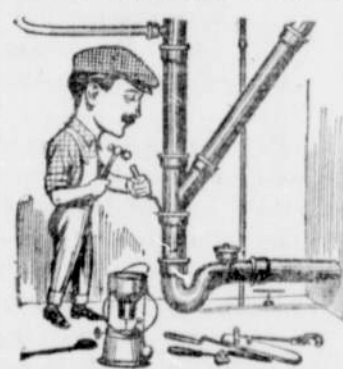
