When We Sew at Home.

With the perfect patterns that we can purchase at the present time it is much easier for women to sew at home than it used to be when one waist pattern served for every woman in the neighborhood, being enlarged for the stout and taken in for the thin until it was worn to tatters, when some other woman must purchase one to fit her own for a and then pass it along to all her neighbors.

Now with our accurate patterns and full directions we may safely do much of our own sewing at home. The directions should always be read over very carefully before the garment is out, as this will often prevent serious mistakes. Then when the different pieces are all cut out and notched they should be basted with the utmost precision, with fine thread. Seams should be taken up as allowed in the pattern, and the skirt and waist should be lengthened or shortened according to directions. In making the placket cut the underlap double about one and one-half inches wide when finished and allow it to extend one and one-half inches below the placket opening; joining the underlap to the seam. The opposite side should be faced the same width as the underlap, and the hooks and eyes sewed on carefully not more than one and one-half inches apart.

The trouble with the necks of shirt waists which cause them to hump in the back is that the space in the back of the neck between the shoulder seams is too narrow. The neck should be divided into three equal portions, back and two fronts. To give a smooth set around the neck the neck band should always be a little longer than the neck of the waist, the latter being "nicked" here and there as it is sewed in.—Wisconsin Agriculturist.

New Drainage District.

Residents of the Norway section owning a majority of the land requiring drainage, seeking to establish a drainage district, filed a petition with the county court asking the creation of such a district, but the court ordered that further information regarding the proposition be furnished. That information has been collected by Engineer Hall-Lewis and will be reduced to a map, which will be submitted to the commissioners at the present time. The watershed, embracing several hundred acres, is into a marsh of approximately thirty acres, and this tract the promoters seek to drain. J. D. Clinton, B. F. Wyatt and P. S. Robinson are the principal owners of lands affected.—Coquille Sentinel.

Decision Affects Tide Lands.

A decision of more than ordinary interest to many residents of Coos county is that handed down by the Supreme court last week. In the action on which the ruling was made the Dock Commission of Portland sought tide lands in front of that of an individual owner, without compensating the latter, for municipal purposes, the State intervening on the theory that these lands belong to the people. In the decision the court holds that title to the submerged lands rest in the upland owners and that it cannot be taken away or appropriated without due compensation therefore. The decision mentions Coos and Coquille rivers and says that the act of 1862 clearly grants the wharfage rights across the state lands to the harbor line to the riparian owner; that the same has not been revoked, and that the legislature and that the legislature and courts have repeatedly recognized these rights.—Coquille Sentinel.
