Law on Salaries of Port Commissioners.

In answer to the notion that the Port commissioners will have a soft job, here is the law:

"No commissioner shall either directly or indirectly receive any salary or compensation for his services as a commissioner, or for acting as an officer of said corporation." The "corporation" herein mentioned is composed of all the "inhabitants" of the district or territory described and incorporated at the Port election and which shall be officially proclaimed and specified by the county court in case of an affirmative vote by the inhabitants of said district or territory. Thus the Port corporation is the people, and the commissioners are the peoples' servants and must serve without salary or commission, either DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY.

These commissioners shall be elected "at each succeeding general election," the first five, however, being appointed by the Governor.

The law of the initiative, referendum and recall is now in full force and effect and would apply to the Port commissioners. The only danger in the Port commission is the danger of defeat on August 27th.

The Hygiene of a Town.

How many people realize that the town's appearance is a vital point in its commercial life? Every one will admit that a man will be more successful if he is well groomed. Does he like the old town? Is he proud to bring his his chums of the campus home with him? Will he be willing to come back here to make his start in the business world? Remember that there may be much truth in the expression that "what we never had we never miss," but your boy had four years in a progressive town and he is going to miss the clean streets, the neat lawns and the well kept homes if they are not there.

If you keep your boy here in this town, your only salvation lies in making this town a better place in which to live. Don't wait for some one else to set the pace. Get busy with the rake, a hammer and nails and some paint. Don't put it off until a more convenient time; that time never comes. Of course, you are not responsible for the condition of your neighbor's buildings and lawn; but by making a start, you will be doing him a favor and indirect a favor to this town. If your neighbor has pride he will want his place to look as well as yours. I no one breaks the ice the town will deteriorate and, perchance disappear.—Marsfield Record.
