Consider Mexican Situation.

Washington, D. C., July 24.—Consideration of the Mexican situation took much of the time of the President and cabinet at the regular session and Secretary Bryan had a long conference with the President before the other members arrived. The administration is looking forward to the first hand information from Ambassador Wilson now on his way from Mexico City. The attitude of the administration is still unchanged, it is authoritatively stated.

The Cabinet was unanimously in accord with President Wilson in waiting for the return to stable conditions before extending the recognition to Mexico. Secretary Bryan announced that he will cancel any lecture engagement which could conflict with the conference he and the President will have with Ambassador Wilson next week.

Entanglements Too Great

Because of legal entanglements which encumber the property of the defunct Coquille Lumber company, it is found impossible for the Alfred Jonson Lumber company, whose plant at Randolph was recently destroyed by fire, to operate the sawmill. The Jonson people expressed a willingness to take over the property, repair and enlarge the capacity of the mill, and operate it, provided the litigation could be speedily terminated. The property is in the hands of a receiver, and it will be necessary for the court to render a decree in the litigation now pending before anything can be done. It is expected that a decree will be given at the September term.

The Messrs. Johnson, whose homes are in Coquille, and Capt. Robert Dollar, their associate, were favorably impressed with Coquille's earnestness and liberality in endeavoring to secure the industry and were inclined to take over the property if ways and means could be devised.

Their inability to gain immediate possession thereof is a matter for serious regret. —Coquille Sentinel.

Portland Officials Say I. W. W. Must Cease There.

Portland, July 21—War to a finish upon the Industrial Workers of the World has been declared by Sheriff Word, Mayor Albee and Chief of Police Clark. The three are working in complete accord.

Advices were received by the Sheriff's office that a body of Industrial Workers of the World, 100 strong, are on their way to this city from San Francisco, shipping into Southern Oregon as railroad laborers and then beating their way north.

If the Industrial Workers of the World endeavor to flock into Portland and make trouble, declares the Sheriff, they will be shown a short way out and will have to go.

"The city officials and this office are working in perfect harmony," stated the Sheriff, "and we are able to cope with the situation. If necessary we will make Kelly Butte a 'bull pen' and take care of 500 agitators there. This matter has got to stop and stop quick and we intend to do it."

"We are working with the sheriff's office," stated Mayor Albee. "Every move made in this campaign now under way was discussed first. The men representing the police force and the sheriff's office will work as one force. This matter has gone far enough."

"My men have been instructed to work in full accord with the deputy sheriffs and to back them up whenever necessary," says Chief of Police Clark. "Patience ceases to be a virtue."

The first move to rid the city of the agitators who have been villifying public officials, desecrating the American flag and endeavoring to create a general strike, tying up every line of industrial endeavor in the city of Portland, was made Tuesday night, when police officials and deputy sheriffs broke up a meeting at Sixth and Washington, lodging nine men in the county jail.
