Trains Running by Jan. 1.

Trains will be running between Eugene and Mapleton by January 1, on the Willamette & Pacific Railroad, the new road which is to connect Eugene with Marshfield, at Coos Bay. It is possible that even before the end of the year the trains will be in operation. The distance between Eugene and Mapleton is considered the worst for those who try to reach Coos Bay overland in the winter months, for from Mapleton they can travel down the lakes by launch to the beach.

No less than 3000 men are now working on the road, divided among 32 camps. Porter Brothers have about 2300 men at work and Twoby Brothers 700. More men are needed for the contractors are endeavoring to take advantage of the summer weather. Men are being shipped in from Portland and San Francisco daily.

This summer the main force is being centered on the line between Eugene and Mapleton so as to have that completed first. There are many miles of rock work beyond Mapleton which is not being touched at present and the builders can work on that during the winter when dirt work is difficult to handle. Already the contractors have started on the long bore of the main tunnel, which will be nearly a mile in length when completed, being more than 4000 feet in length. The contract calls for this tunnel to be finished by October 5, 1914.

From Mapleton the road will skirt Clear Lake, Five Mile Lake and Seven Mile Lake, a fisherman's paradise.—Portland Telegram, July 23.
